STOCKS GAIN OVER ATTACK

Active Demand for Rail- shares Develops

(Wall Street Journal Financial Review)
NEW YORK, June 24.—Stocks developed pronounced rallying tendencies today despite professional attempts to extend the previous session's declines. Strong support made itself felt at the crucial moment and the market leaders scored good recoveries from their recent lows.

Undoubtedly the most important factor in the general improvement was the active demand for railroad shares which sprang up simultaneously with the resumption of the Nickel Plate hearings by the interstate commerce commission.

In the industrial group the rally was led by the standard industrials, including American Can, General Electric, Mack Truck and other motor shares.

Steels were held back by the rather unsatisfactory steel trade review, which shed no new light on the situation in the steel industry. The market closed higher. Closing prices in round:

Drop In Price Drastic In Trading In Grains

CHICAGO, June 24.—Grain futures finished within a fraction of the bottom on the Chicago board of trade today. Corn led in the weakness but was not the market leader. Wheat's strength came early, based on shorts' activities and higher prices. Not unlike yesterday, however, the advance was erased in late profit taking.

Corn lost its only support to higher prices when wheat turned weak. Conditions, both in actual grain and the crop, are bearish.

Oats followed other grains to a lower finish. Aggressive support was lacking.

A good deal of commission house selling weakened positions.
