

Babe Ruth's Usefulness Ended For Rest Of The Season

LEGS GIVE OUT ON SWAT KING

Is Barely Able to Walk When Benched

 NEW YORK, June 25.—Babe Ruth is lost for the rest of the season as a regular and he may be hit by a few slugs from the end of his career.

The Babe was benched yesterday in Washington when his legs became so swollen and sore that he could hardly walk. Before the team left New York it was known that Babe was not in good shape and the management had become reconciled to the fact that he could not be used much longer.

It is an established fact that a player in the major leagues lasts only as long as his legs. When he is an old man Babe Ruth may be able to stand at the bat and hit them because a good eye lasts long. John McGraw today can stand at the plate and show a rookie how to hit, but he can't give him an actual demonstration of fielding and base running.

Ty Cobb and Tris Speaker are showing up not because their eyes are getting bad or their arms are losing strength but because their legs are going back on them. Deacon Scott, the former Yankee shortstop, almost passed out of the major leagues for the same reason when waters were asked on him recently.

For a big, bulky man, Babe always has had rather slight legs and several veteran trainers expressed the opinion years ago that his career would not be as long as Cook's, Speaker's or Collins'.

They said that he was not built to last and that he used himself up too much.

Without the babe in there every day there is slight hope for the Yankees to get anywhere in the American league pennant race in which the team is pretty well shot. It may not finish in the first division and that is quite a drop all at once. He will remain with the team but he will be used only as a pinch hitter. Veach and Paschal will play right field.

SUZANNE LENGLEN BACK TO OLD FORM

Tennis Star Takes Straight Sets From Miss Ryan

 WIMBLEDON, England, June 25.—Making her first appearance in singles competition since she defaulted her world's championship last June, Miss Suzanne Lenglen, the French star, defeated Miss Elizabeth Ryan, the former Californian in the British national championship tournament at 6-2 and 6-0.

The French girl's victory over the player who had been ranked as her most formidable rival in the tournament was just as easy as the scores indicate. Her game also convinced the critics that she is in old time form and that if her health holds out she is quite certain to win the championship again.

Miss Ryan battled the French girl on fairly even terms early in the first set when she won the first two games, but when Miss Lenglen got her game going she found an opponent that was almost helpless against her.

Ray Casey, San Francisco, was one of the few Americans to survive the third round. He defeated the Swedish Davis cup star, Von Braun, in straight sets at 6-3.

Casey had difficulty getting length into his game in the early part of the match. Von Braun won the first two games of the first set and took the first three games of the second set.

When the American steadied he walked away from his opponent. The crowd laughed politely at the harassed efforts of Von Braun to handle Casey's slyed services.

Makes Hole In One Stroke In British Championships

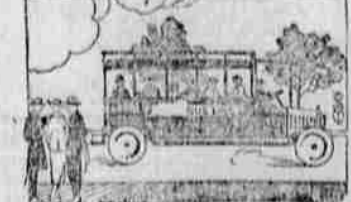
