

# Kearns Will Take Troubles Into Courts, Now Forecast

## ASKS LICENSE AS A SECOND

### Commission Insists He Reach Dempsey

(U. P. Special Wire to The Bend Bulletin) NEW YORK, June 26.—Jack Kearns will go to court if the New York boxing commission persists in the refusal to grant him a renewal of his second license.

Kearns wants to be back of his new protegee, Mickey Walker, when the welterweight champion meets Harry Greb for the middleweight title and he has been trying to put some political pressure on the commission with very little success.

The commission told Kearns when he asked how he could go about getting a license, that he couldn't do anything until he brought Jack Dempsey into the office and had him express himself on the challenge of Harry Wills.

Dempsey is in Europe and will not be back in time for the Greb-Walker fight and as the commission has no particular affection for Kearns or Dempsey, it looks like Kearns is in a hole.

Kearns plans to appear again before the commission at its meeting today. The Walker-Shade match, which has caused so much trouble for Walker, is up in the air again.

Kearns, who was ordered to get a promoter for the Walker-Shade welterweight championship match, arranged it with Jack Doyle, the California promoter, but Leo Flynn, the manager of Shade, said today that he would not allow Shade to fight in California because the match was worth more in the east.

It has been believed for some time that Shade cannot make the weight and that he does not want to fight Walker any place.

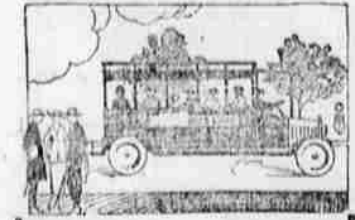

## BEND HIGH COACH IS ROCKNE PUPIL

### Riney Is Taking Summer Course At Corvallis

James C. Riney, who coached the Bend high school football team to a Central Oregon championship and a place on a par with the best in the state last fall, is learning still more about football this summer. He is one of the 125 coaches and others who are studying the game under the direction of Knute Rockne, head coach of the Notre Dame university eleven, national leaders for several years past. Rockne is conducting a two weeks' course at the O. A. C. summer school.

Rockne's course covers every phase of football, some of the points taken up being equipment, dieting, training, offense, fundamentals, tactics and strategy, forward pass, defense, mental aspect, signal systems, scouting, shifts and shift plays, rules and development of team work.

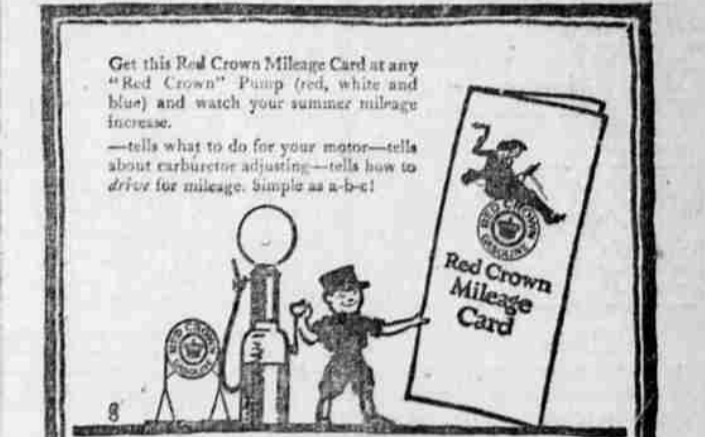
