MONEY STRONG, STOCKS ALSO

Prophets of Sharp Break At Disadvantage

(Wall Street Journal Financial Review)

NEW YORK, June 26.—Although money continued relatively strong, renewing at 4 1/2 per cent and advancing to 5 per cent, stocks gave the most impressive demonstration of their technical strength seen in several weeks. Operators who had taken a short position in the belief that the recent action of the market suggested that a sharp break was imminent, were forced to make costly revisions in their trading ideas.

Southern Railway and Canadian Pacific headed the rally, while advancing tendencies among the indus-

tries were concentrated especially in the low priced motors, including Pierce-Arrow, Packard and Hupmobile, and in the rubber shares, particularly United States Rubber and Lee Tire, public utilities also were strong with Electric Power & Light and American & Foreign Power in active demand.
