

Broadway Jones Romps Home With Latonia Derby Purse

NADI FAVORITE AS RACE OPENS

Flying Ebony Not Even In the Money

LATONIA RACE TRACK, June 27.—Broadway Jones, star of the K. R. Bradley stables and pride of Kentucky riding patrons, won the Latonia derby here today. King Nadi was second in a driving finish, and Progress, coming from far back, nosed into third place.

The race was one of the greatest turf battles ever seen here. King Nadi, the favorite, always among the contenders, was beaten by a scant neck as the field of 11 reached the finish.

Step Along made the early pace and Swope took the lead at the half. Broadway Jones gradually worked his way to the front and held on to the finish despite a vigorous challenge by King Nadi, which came fast in the stretch.

Flying Ebony, winner of the Kentucky derby, would have received an added \$5,000 had he won the Latonia classic, but never was a contender.

Progress, the only maiden in the race, showed unusual class, outracing such horses as Swope and Captain Hal.

There was an added prize of \$25,000 on the derby, run today for the 48th time.

Broadway Jones paid \$5.50 to \$1 in the outwits.

King Nadi paid on a \$2 ticket \$5.10 for place and \$3 to show, while Progress paid \$4 to show.

The victory of the Bradley colt was due in great measure to the coolness and judgment of his rider, Harley Meyer. The boy kept his mount close to the rail all the way around, saved much ground and timed his run to perfection. He made his first serious move with his mount after they had traveled the half mile when he rushed to the front.

King Nadi, always in close quarters, got clear at the stretch turn and the two hooked up in a heart breaking dash to the wire.

The race was worth \$25,225 to the winner.

HENNESSEY, CASEY STAY IN DOUBLES

Australian Pair Losers In Wimbledon Play

WIMBLEDON, England, June 27.—John Hennessey and Hay Casey, the young American team, survived the first round of the doubles competition in the British national tennis championships here today by defeating three Australian pair, R. W. Heath and R. Taylor, in 6-4, 8-10, 6-3 and 6-2.

The Americans were superior on their service and all around court play and they were much sturdier than the Australians.

Henri Cochet, France, defeated Jagat Mohan Lal, at 6-2, 1-6, 6-2 and 6-3 and entered the fifth round, where he will meet Hennessey, the sole surviving American in the slugs.

Suzanne Lenglen, teamed with Borotra, beat Timmer and Miss Bowman 6-2 and 6-10 in the second round of the mixed doubles.

H. C. Fisher survived the fourth round when he defeated A. H. Fyee at 6-4, 6-6 and 7-5. Fisher will meet Anderson in the fifth round.

Lenglen Wins Easily From British Leader

WIMBLEDON, England, June 27.—Another cinch victory on her romp through the field in the British national tennis championships was scored today by Mlle Lenglen, the French star, when she ran away with Mrs. Beaumont, one of the British stars, in two sets, at 6-0.

The former world's champion was invincible and her game caused an ovation from 15,000 spectators at the end of the match.

After a terrific struggle that came somewhat as a surprise, James O. Anderson, the Australian Davis cup star, defeated Jacques Brugnon, France, in a five-set match. The scores were 3-6, 7-9, 6-4, 7-5 and 6-2.

H. F. L. Barclay, the Tasmanian captain, eliminated Colonel Mayer, Canada, 6-2, 4-6, 1-6, 6-3 and 6-1. Barclay will meet Jean Borotra, France, the defending champion, in the next round.

The American team, Williams and Finner, survived the first round of the doubles by defeating the British pair, Elleringham and Sherwell, at 6-4, 6-3, 5-7, 7-9 and 8-6.

Louis Dalley, the American, and H. B. Jarvis, England, won their first doubles match from the formidable British pair, C. G. N. Turnbull and S. B. Gilbert, at 7-5, 5-7, 6-0, 5-7 and 6-3.

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BALL TOO LIVELY, PLAYERS DEPLORE

Becomes Real Danger, Says Giant Manager

NEW YORK, June 27.—General protests against the use of the lively ball are causing so much stir among the players and the managers in the major leagues that the officials may have to make some changes to protect the players.

Ever since Babe Ruth started the vogue for long hitting the players have contended that more life was being put in the ball but the charge was steadfastly denied by the professional leagues. This year the players claim that the ball is livelier than ever and they complain that pitchers and infielders are actually in danger of their lives.

John J. McGraw, manager of the New York Giants, came out today virtually with a demand that something be done to make a stand against the ball. He said there was no doubt that the ball now being used was too lively and that it was a grave danger to the players.

More players have been hurt already this season than in any two seasons in the past and it does not seem that clumsy fielding is the cause or that pitching has become so inferior that ordinary batters can knock the hide off the ball.

Although ball makers maintain clubs, with a membership of more than 40,000, and is represented in specifications, there is no other way every state and in Hawaii.
