Several forest fires were started in the Fremont national forest and in the south end of the Deschutes forest by the electrical storm which passed to the east of Bend, coming from the south, shortly before 10 o'clock last night.

The start of a forest fire in the Fort Rock district was witnessed late last night by H. S. Nedrey, lookout stationed on Pine mountain. Nedrey saw the bolt of lightning dart from the clouds to the timber, and later saw the flames eating their way through the pines.

Although several smaller fires were started in the south end of the Deschutes national forest by the electrical storm of last night, the north end of the forest is free from fires, forest officials report.

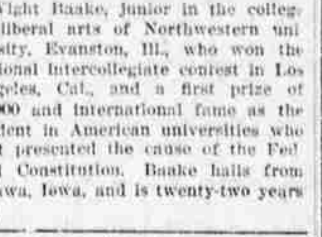
