PRICES FALL ON EXCHANGE

Quake In California Has Effect On Trading

(Wall Street Journal Financial Review) NEW YORK, June 29.—After promising for three hours to be a featureless affair, today's market developed pronounced activity at declining prices on news of an earthquake in Southern California and a run up in call money to 6 per cent, the highest rate in 18 months.

Call money renewed at 4 1/2 per cent and was marked up to 5 per cent and then to 5 1/2 per cent without exercising an adverse influence on stock prices. But when it was increased to 6 per cent simultaneously with the reports regarding the extent of loss of life at Santa Barbara, it was more than the general list could stand up under. Heavy selling broke out in various sections of the list, converting principally on Southern Pacific and various other companies operating in Southern California, including General Petroleum, Pacific Oil and Pan-American.

When further dispatches disclosed that the disturbances around Santa Barbara was purely local, steadiness was restored to the general list, which displayed a fairly good tone in the final dealings.

Oats followed other grains to a lower close. Provisions were greatly weakened by grains and increased offers. Packing house bulls were liberal sellers.
