BOUTS LISTED FOR JULY 3RD

The Dalles Boy to Meet Fred Gilbert

With all six fighters near the peak of their strenuous training, everything is in readiness for the fight card which will be staged at the Hippodrome on the night of July 3 under the auspices of the bricklayers' and plasterers' local, reports O. B. Montgomery, matchmaker. The main event of the 22 round fight card will be a 10 round go between Fred Gilbert of Bend and Art Bibby of The Dalles.

All six fighters will work out tonight in the old K. of C. hall on Wall street. These workouts are open to the public. Earl Stoltz, who is to step 10 rounds with Sub Desu in the semi final, will work out with Bibby and Eckhart tonight at 6:30. Eckhart is matched for a four round bout with Frankie Gasport, Gilbert, Desu and Gasport will work out at 7:30. The Dalles fighter has been in Bend for the past two weeks, in hard training, and local fight fans who have seen him to his staff predict that Gilbert will have to use all he has if he is to make a favorable showing against the victor. Bibby is not only a clever boxer, but he is also an aggressive fighter. Just how Gilbert's defensive tactics will work against Bibby's aggressiveness is problematical. Gilbert and Bibby will fight at 10.

Desu, with his career locally as a fighter at stake, is out to get Stoltz in this fight. Stoltz laid away the aggressive Idaho fighter with a neat tap on the jaw in the card staged here several weeks ago, and Desu is determined to show that his little lacer into birdie land was due to his over eagerness to make a good showing. Desu won a knockout over Gilbert at the Elks' smoker about one month ago.

These places of business in Bend will remain open until 9 o'clock on the night of July 3. Matchmaker Montgomery announces that the card will not start until 9:30. The gates will open at 8 o'clock.

PREMIER ATHLETES OF AMERICA MEET

Many In San Francisco for July Contests

Leased Wire to The Bend Bulletin) SAN FRANCISCO, June 29.—The pride of the American athletes was moving into San Francisco today for the national track and field championships which will be held in this city's stadium July 3, 4 and 5. Sixty-two members of the Hollywood athletic club left their city by automobile, accompanied by 200 supporters. They will be temporarily domiciled here tonight and will be on the track tomorrow for workouts. Nineteen members of the New York athletic club, including some of the brightest lights of track and field, and six stars of the Boston athletic club had their first workouts in the stadium yesterday after arrival from the east.

Jackson Scholz, Frank Hussey, Alan Hoffrich, Jimmy Connelly, Nelson Sherill, Pat McDonald and Matt McCreath are some of the better known stars here. Lloyd Hahn and J. P. Murray are among the Poston bunch. The Illinois Athletic club, Chicago Athletic association and Los Angeles Athletic club delegations are expected today or tomorrow. Heats for the junior 100 yard, 220 yard, 120 yard high hurdles, 220 yard low hurdles and 440 yard hurdles were announced for Friday morning.

Frenchman Eliminates Last American Player
