Shattuck died Thursday afternoon after telling his daughter, Velma, that he was not feeling well. He asked for a glass of water. Death was believed to be due to apoplexy.

A.M. CRAWFORD DIES OF HEART FAILURE

Ex-state Attorney Stricken At East Lake

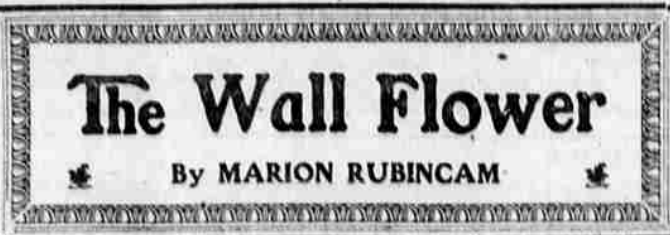
A. M. Crawford of Portland, attorney general of Oregon from January 13, 1903, until January 3, 1915, died at the East lake summer resort, in the Paulina mountains southeast of Bend, shortly after midnight last night.

Information relative to the death of Crawford was contained in a telephone message from East lake to Dr. G. W. Winslow, acting coroner, early this morning.

Crawford was elected attorney general of Oregon on the republican ticket in the fall of 1902. He was reelected in 1906 and again in 1910.

Crawford in 1914 was candidate for nomination for governor on the republican ticket. In connection with his campaign, he visited Bend, delivering an address here on April 29 of that year.
