

Harry Wills Is Big Favorite In Battle Against Weinert

QUICK DECISION NOW REQUISITE

Black Man Must Show Form to Ask Title

 NEW YORK, July 1.—Harry Wills, the giant stevedore, is a favorite to win from Charley Weinert, revived white hope, when they meet here tomorrow night in one of the featured bouts of a card that is to be staged for the benefit of the Italian hospital fund.

Wills, while he warrants a long price, is up against a serious proposition that will have everything to do with his future prospects. Weinert is not any too dangerous, despite the noise being made about him, but Wills must win quickly and decisively or give up his claim to first consideration as a heavyweight challenger.

On two previous occasions Wills has blown himself right out of a place where he could force Dempsey to fight him or step down off the throne, by making a very poor showing in two rather inferior fights. Against Bartley Madden, who by no means could be considered as anything but a tough punching bag, Wills looked no better than a good second rater, and when he fought Fat Luis Firpo he looked almost as bad as the winner as Firpo did as the loser.

If there is such a thing as a dictator with power enough to keep Wills from knocking out a white man, he had better declare himself out tomorrow night and take a chance on using his real form and best efforts. Wills has lost prestige since Gene Tunney stopped Tom Gills here, even if he has the protection of the New York boxing commission in keeping any other contender away from the first crack at Dempsey. If he does not look like a champion against Weinert he might as well quit boxing.

Of the unattached athletes, the leading star is the Hart Hubbard, colored jumper and sprinter, whose new broad jump record in the intercollegiate championships was this year's athletic sensation.

Charles Brookings, former Iowa hurdler, is another unattached entrant.

RUTH CLOUTS HOMER

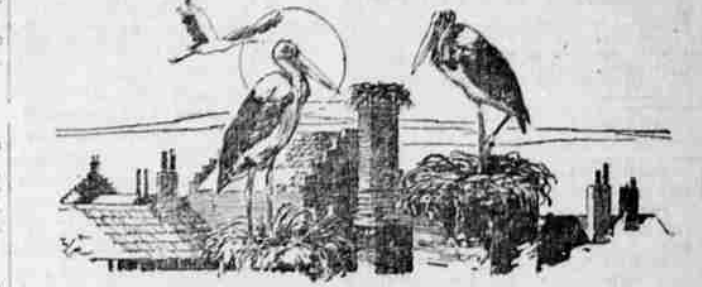
