STOCK MARKET FOUND BUOYANT

See Big Trade Activity From Now On

(Wall Street Journal Financial Review) NEW YORK, July 1.—July and the beginning of the final half of 1925 found the stock market in a buoyant frame of mind. Having shown its ability to resist the highest money rate in six months, professionals working for lower prices were apprehensive as to what the general list would do when the funds distributed in semi-annual dividends and interest payments started to find their way back to New York. The market had the stimulus of many constructive business items which conclusively demonstrated that the next few months were destined for a degree of trade activity which would be in striking contrast to last year's protraction dullness. As a consequence brisk buying operations in various sections of the list helped along the upward movement. The market closed irregular. Closing prices included: U. S.
