

Stage Is All Set For Big Fistic Program In New York

CROWD OF 60,000 IS LOOKED FOR

Greb, Wills and Slattery Are Big Favorites

(U. P. Leased Wire to The Bend Bulletin) NEW YORK, July 2.—Improved weather conditions this afternoon reduced the chances of an enforced postponement of the Italian hospital fund bouts scheduled tonight at the Polo grounds. The skies cleared before noon, it stopped raining and the threatening clouds gave way before a bright sunshine.

"It looks almost certain now that we will not have to postpone the bouts," Humbert Pugazzi, chairman of the committee in charge, said shortly after noon. "There still is a demand for tickets and it looks like it will be a sell out."

If all the tickets are sold it will mean a crowd of about 60,000 and receipts of about \$500,000.

Jimmy Slattery, Harry Greb and Harry Wills were favorites to emerge as the winners and some were taking a long shot with bets that the three feature contests would end in knockouts.

The weights of the fighters were announced as follows: Sharkey 124 and Lynch 122½; Slattery 162½ and Shade 153; Wills 215 and Weibert 194½; Greb 159 and Walker 152.

Slattery, 29 year old Buffalo middleweight, is to meet Dave Shade, recognized challenger for the welterweight championship; Greb, world's middleweight champion, defends his title against Mickey Walker, welterweight champion, and Wills will try to prove himself the outstanding contender for the heavyweight championship against Charles Weibert, a come-back from the white hope days.

What money is left after the boxers are paid will be turned over to the Italian hospital fund and the indications are that the show would be a success and that the receipts would be as much as \$550,000.

Without as much as five to one, it was almost impossible to place a bet on the three favorites.

The four round opener between Joe Lynch, former bantamweight champion, and Jack Sharkey, leading contender four years ago, was the only bout on the card regarded as even choice.

Chances of Wills and Walker depend largely upon the real condition of their opponents. If Weibert is not in the condition he was when he fought Luis Firpo he will be a cinch for Wills. Walker's chances to become a double title holder are slight if Greb is the speedy, tireless bounding and lashing Greb that he was a year ago.

Unless he is the most overrated fighter developed in years, Slattery has no chance to lose against Shade as the Californian is utterly without a punch and it is doubtful that Dempsey could outspeed "Bats" over a six round route.

The first bout is scheduled to go on about 8 o'clock eastern daylight time, and the main bout, it was announced, must not start later than 10 o'clock.

The fighters weigh in this afternoon at 2 p. m. in the office of the commission.

(U. P. Leased Wire to The Bend Bulletin) WIMBLEDON, July 2.—Rene Lacoste, one of the young French team and the runner up for the championship last year, defeated James O. Anderson, the Australian star, in the semi final round of the British national tennis championships. The scores were 6-4, 7-5 and 6-1.

Anderson was one of the heavy favorites in the tournament in spite of his recent illness and his defeat in the final round again an all French affair as Lacoste will meet Jean Borotra, the defending champion for the title.

New Records Expected At San Francisco Meet

SAN FRANCISCO, July 2.—With only a few unattached entrants not yet on the scene, the pick of American athletes went through their final papers here today in preparation for the national track and field championship events in Kezar stadium, opening tomorrow and continuing through Sunday.

Interest in the events is being shared between the efforts of the Olympic club of San Francisco and other organizations to wrest the championship from the Illinois Athletic club and the performances of individual stars.

De Hart Hubbard, colored broad jumping champion, drew a crowd when he exhibited his style in tentative tryouts in the jumping pit.

Hubbard, who is credited with 9.2-5 seconds in the 100 yard dash this year, is believed to have a good chance officially to break the record. He will have the hottest and of competition in Jackson Scholz and Alfred Leoney.

Murray Hulbert, president of the Amateur Athletic Union of the United States, will referee the games, in which approximately 300 Olympic, national and intercollegiate champions will compete.

They will meet the French stars, Mile Lenglen and Jean Borotra, in the semi final.

In the semi final, Borotra beat his countryman, Cochet.
