He was president of the Redmond Commercial club last year, Quigley, at one time a newspaper writer in Chicago, has frequently been referred to as "the poet of the sagelands" because of his literary work.

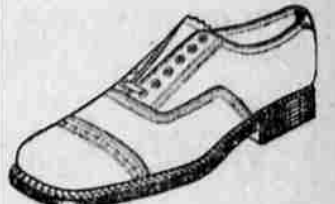

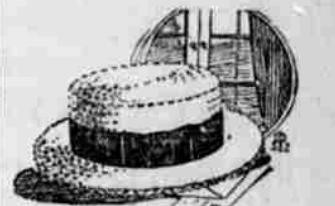
