FOOD FOR THOUGHT FOUND AT LIBRARY

New Books On Education and Ethics Are Listed

Much material for the thoughtful and introspective will be found among the new books at the Deschutes county library, a list of which has been furnished by Miss Helen Johns, librarian. Several books of practical value for homemakers and a quantity of fiction and travel description is also included:

For the Home

Home Conveniences—Ives. Useful to prospective home builders, housewives and campers. Gives suggestions on heating, lighting, sewage disposal, laundry appliances, handy devices, plumbing fixtures and refrigeration.

The Craft of Hand Made Rugs—Hicks. Tells how to make braided, knitted, crocheted, needle woven and rag rugs. Interestingly illustrated.

The Happy Baby—Holt. The author says, "The bringing up of children is certainly to be classed as one of the occupations requiring highly skilled persons, if results which are satisfactory are to be expected." Here he gives suggestions for starting the child out right.

Education

The Discovery of Intelligence—Hart. An interpretation of history from primitive times to the present, from the point of view of the growth of education.

The Platoon School—Spain. Explains the modern platoon or work study play school, which divided all of the school classes into two large groups, or platoons, alternating between the "home rooms" where the three Rs are taught, and the rooms for special activities where children receive training on the social, physical and vocational phases of life.

Ethics and Religion

The Bible and Common Sense—King. King tries to show in sincerely written chapters what the Bible means to him personally.

Reveries of a Father—Crawley. Thoughtful parents will find their own methods and theories corroborated in these brief chapters discussing children's reading, introducing them to music, vacations, interests, duties and friends.

What Men Live By—Cabot. A physician's finely idealistic discussion of the significance and value of work, play, love and worship, based on the author's convincing belief that the wholesome interplay of these four is essential to "more abundant life."
