

Best Grade Of Football To Be Played In Central Oregon

OLDER SQUADS TO BE WORKED

Possibility of Outside Games Looms

Better football than ever before will be played among the Central Oregon high schools this fall.

This prediction is being made freely now that the football practice season is only two months away and the thoughts of sports followers are returning to the plucky game, which is threatening to dethrone baseball as America's national game and already has in this vicinity.

There are several reasons for the prediction. The first is that such of the three leading high schools of the district will have this fall a really competent coach who knows his material and is familiar with the task that is before him.

These are the same coaches who were on the job last year—James C. Riney at Bend, Borden Beck at Redmond and Norval Powell at Prineville. But last year Riney was a new man who had to introduce a new system of play and new ideas of training to his squad. Beck had just lost by graduation almost the entire string of athletes who had won three successive championships; and Powell found himself with an entire fourth of experienced backfield material, except for one man who was laid up much of the time by injuries.

This fall it will be distinctly different. Riney will have, according to the present outlook, seven or eight of last year's regulars and a number of men who showed promise as substitutes or on the second team last year. And all of them will be already accustomed to his system.

Prineville Has Punch

Beck at Redmond will start the season with all but two of the men whom he had lined up to a real football team about the end of last season. They were nearly all young boys, at that, which means they will be bigger and more aggressive this fall. The two who will not be back are Stanley, halfback, and Lyons, guard.

At Prineville, a majority of the players who came so near upsetting Bend's chances for a clean white this year, will be out again with a year's additional weight and punch. Powell, James O'Kelley, quarterback; Starr, his best guard; the Gray brothers, guard and halfback; G. Gaylord, end, and Helms, another end.

But there are still two of the Gaylord brothers to play on the ends, plenty of husky linemen, and for backfield men, Grimes, who probably won't have so many injuries this year, the Arnold brothers—Prineville runs strong to brothers—Donnelly and yes another brother, the younger Grimes. Powell will have a backfield this year, and he can always build a strong line from the wealth of Crook county linebacks he has to draw from.

So much for material. But there are still other reasons why the football in Central Oregon will be better this fall.

Other Teams to Compete

Instead of Redmond, Bend is the target at which the other Central Oregon teams will shoot their heavy artillery this year. The old duel will settle down again with a new setting. Last year it was broken up, with nobody ruling the roost and the others trying to shake him off. The teams became almost friendly, which doesn't do at all in football. This fall they'll be at each other's throats (figuratively, of course) just as in the old days, but with the science of the game on a more advanced footing.

Then too, Central Oregon football will not mean merely a few games between Bend, Prineville, Redmond and Madras this year. If Madras has a team at all—which is doubtful for several reasons—it will not be, according to present indications, the

contented that it was last season. That means that the other teams will play only one game against Madras if any, which leaves room on the schedule for several games with strong teams from other parts of the state—The Dalles, Klamath Falls, and others. It was demonstrated last year that such games will draw paying crowds, and more of them will be scheduled for now on.

Playing against better teams and with a wider outlet for their talents will give the Central Oregon athletes more incentive for improvement, and that again means, as has been said already, that the game played here this fall will be better than that displayed in any previous season.

Helen Wills Trains for Best Season of Career

National Champion Views Molla Mallory and Suzanne Lenglen With All Due Respect

NEW YORK, July 7.—Training for what she hopes will be the best season of her career, Miss Helen Wills, the youthful national tennis champion, will start the eastern season in Boston on Saturday.

She is now living at Forest Hills and playing against male competition at the West Side Tennis club. In her characteristic modest fashion she arrived last week unheralded and had been playing for several days before her presence became known generally. "I am in very good condition," she said today, "and I feel that I am playing better. I played quite a lot of tennis in California before I came east and I am going to play as much as I can here."

The young champion looks lighter than she was last year at Wimbledon and in Paris, and she says she has lost some weight. She also seems faster on her feet and has much more pace in her game.

Although she hesitates to talk about her game, it is apparent that she has no fear of losing the championship crown that she has worn for two years.

She also allows an intimation that she would like to meet Mlle Suzanne Lenglen, the claimant of the world's championship.

"Mlle Lenglen is a superb player," Miss Wills said. "I saw enough of her game in Wimbledon last year to know that, and I understand that she was not playing her best game then. I would like to have gone to Wimbledon this year, not seeking a match with Mlle Lenglen, of course, but to get the experience that is so valuable. I am going to England next year and it may be that we will meet. I may be able to win from her some time when she gets old enough."

The young champion had heard that Mrs. Molla Mallory, the former champion, was training more seriously than ever to regain the crown that she wore for many years.

"Mrs. Mallory," she said, "does not have to do any extra work to beat most players. She always has been a great player and a great competitor. She probably will be stronger, however, since she remained out of a strenuous winter season."
