Anton Ahlstrom made a business trip to Bend on Thursday.

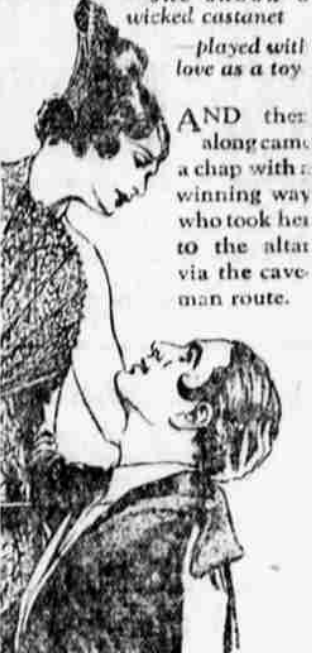
Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Gray of Bend were visiting friends in this neighborhood on Thursday.
