

BUILDING GAIN AGAIN IS SEEN

Figures for June Reach \$30,499 Total

Many Residences Go Up to Meet Need of Rapidly Growing City

As in nearly every previous month this year, the building record for June is a distinct gain over the corresponding month in 1924. There was less activity than in May, but June is always a slack month in building activity.

During the month just ended 25 buildings were started, for a total estimated cost of \$30,499. June, 1924, showed 21 buildings estimated to cost \$20,354. The figure for May of this year was 46 buildings started for a total cost of \$49,675. This shows that the buildings started in June averaged greater in value than those begun in May. Peasants Come to Aid Of Beleaguered Monks

(U. P. Leased Wire to The Bend Bulletin) VIENNA, July 8.—Several were killed, a score injured and 20 arrested as the result of a clash between peasants and police around the Franciscan monastery at Kasechau, Czechoslovakia, which had been guarded for three days by determined peasants.

Armed with stones and pitchforks, the peasants had prevented gun-darmes entering the monastery to investigate charges that a priest had denounced President Masaryk of Czechoslovakia as a heretic.

Police reinforcements, arriving yesterday, fired into the air, but as this did not disperse the monastery defenders, they then charged.

Britain Won't Allow Plea Made by Chinese

(U. P. Leased Wire to The Bend Bulletin) LONDON, July 8.—Great Britain is not prepared to follow the example of Russia, Germany and Austria in renouncing extra territorial privileges in China, Foreign Secretary Austen Chamberlain declared today in response to a question.

The Chinese have contended that abolition of extra territoriality in China would solve existing disturbances and prevent further outbreaks against nationals of lands enjoying such privileges.

The Washington government is anxious for a conference to consider extra territoriality questions.

Mercury Reaches Hundred, Sets Kansas City Record

COUNTY COURT PROCEEDINGS

Bend, Ore., June 27, 1925. The County Court of Deschutes County met this day pursuant to adjournment, whereupon the following proceedings were had, to wit:

In the Matter of Dance Hall License. There was then presented the application for license for public dance hall of George T. Murphy and A. D. Gordon, said dance hall being situated in Tract 28 of Virginia Park, and upon its appearing that said application was signed by twelve freeholders residing in the school district in which the dance hall is located, and that said freeholders certified that the applicants are of good moral character, and requested that license should issue, and upon its further appearing that there was on file with the Court a further petition signed by thirty-eight residents of the vicinity of the location of said dance hall, and upon the Court's being satisfied that the applicants will run an orderly house, it was

ORDERED that license issue to said applicants upon their paying the statutory fees and upon their filing with the Clerk of the Court a bond approved by the Court in a sum of not less than \$500.00, conditioned as set forth in the statute covering such matters.

In the Matter of Market Road Engineer. It then appeared to the Court that, under Chapter 361 of General Laws of Oregon for 1925, it was the duty of the Court to employ a competent engineer, who shall be known as County Engineer; and upon its further appearing that Robert B. Gould is qualified under the statute to act as said County Engineer, it was

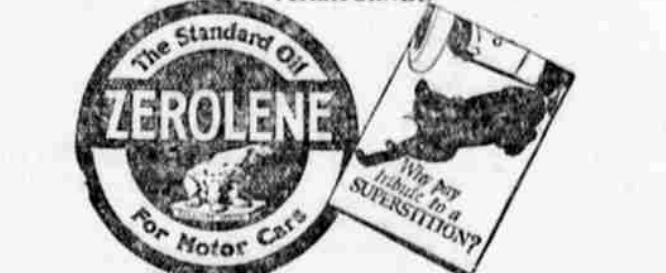

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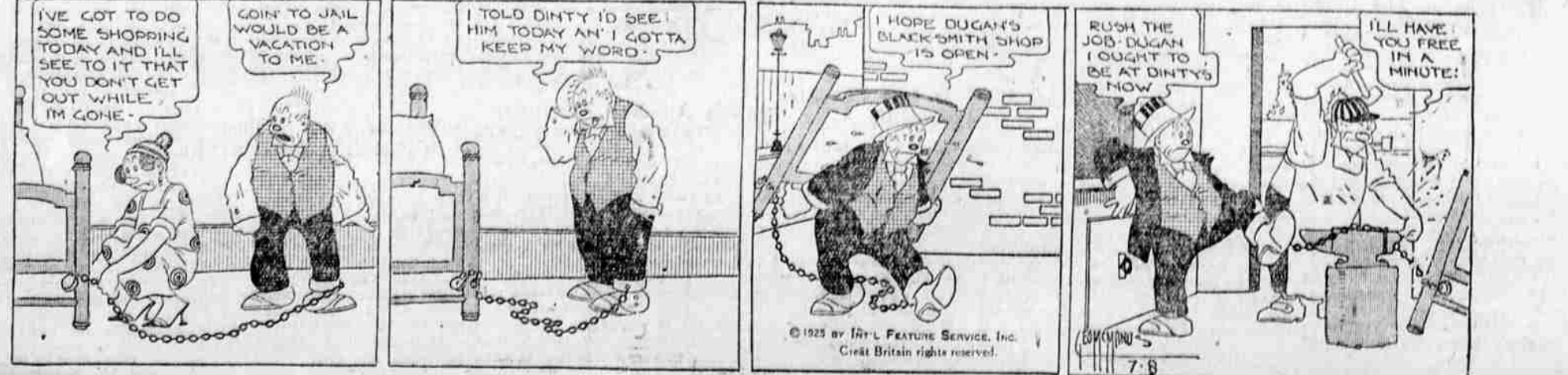
