MONEY EASIER, MARKET GAINS

Steel Receives Much of Attention

(Wall Street Journal Financial Review) NEW YORK, July 8.—Today's market maintained the characteristics of an aggressive bull swing with call money working easier and the business news highly constructive.

Steel shares enjoyed the greatest degree of speculative attention accorded them in recent weeks. With steel common in the leadership, they moved ahead briskly.

After a period of dullness on the reaction in the oil shares the group was again taken up under the stimulus of further important declines in light oil production.

Judging from the relative inactivity of the rails, traders were inclined to view the character of the latest freight statistics in the light of their testimony to the heavy turnover taking place in the industrial and merchandising lines, rather than as an indication of the gratifying earnings the railroads are enjoying.

STATE'S RIGHT SEEN AS ISSUE

Constitution Defied, Says Scopes Lawyer

Bryan Declares It Will Be Appealed Through Courts, Then to People

(U. P. Leased Wire to The Bend Bulletin) DAYTON, Tenn., July 8.—The great issue in the Scopes evolution case is not whether evolution is or is not true, but whether the state of Tennessee has not transcended the limits of its constitution and that of the United States, John B. Neal, senior defense counsel, declared in a statement today in reply to William Jennings Bryan's speech here last night.

A constitutional amendment banishing the evolutionary theory from America schools forever is the distant goal of organized fundamentalism.

It seemed that the proceedings in the Scopes trial, which will start in this little town Friday, are only the first faint rambles of a major battle that ultimately may be fought by the entire American nation.

William Jennings Bryan, mainstay of the prosecution of Scopes, flung down the gage of battle in an address to the Progressive Dayton club at the Aqua hotel last night.

If the Tennessee anti evolution law is held invalid in the lower courts, he said, it will be appealed through all stages to Washington. If the United States supreme court holds it unconstitutional, it will be appealed to the American people.

Counsel Awaited The principal activity in Dayton today was an extended conference of prosecution counsel, with Bryan mapping out the case. E. T. Stewart, attorney general for the 18th Tennessee circuit, arrived here today and brought the prosecution staff to full strength.

The defense is marking time awaiting the coming of Clarence Darrow and Dudley Field Malone. Darrow leaves Chicago on noon today and will get here about noon tomorrow. Malone also will reach here tomorrow.

The program for the trial has begun to take shape. At least two days, Friday and Saturday, and possibly Monday and Tuesday of next week, are to be consumed in selection of the jury. Judge Neal said today the jury would be picked by the defense with every care.

With the jury in its yellow swivel chairs, the legal struggle will be opened with argument on the defense's motion to dismiss the indictment. This may open the way to several days of general argument, as the motion is based on the federal constitutional guarantees.

The purpose of the celebration is to commemorate the events which mark the beginning of Norse immigration to this continent and to pay a fitting tribute to the Norwegian pioneers of America, who had an important part in pushing the frontier of civilization from the Great Lakes to the Pacific.
