DEFENSE WANTS FIRST SESSION TO BE FAST ONE

Will Ask Dismissal of
Scopes Complaint

PICK JURY MONDAY

Bryan Issues More State-
ments, Delivers Speech In
Preparing For Trial

(U. P. Leased Wire to The Bend Bulletin)
DAYTON, Tenn., July 9.—A brief opening session of the Scopes trial tomorrow, followed by adjournment until Monday, was reported to be under consideration by defense counsel today.

According to word reaching here, Clarence Darrow, who will arrive at 5:30 p. m. today, will ask the court to entertain arguments on the motion to dismiss the Scopes indictment, as soon as court convenes.

This move would dispose of preliminary obstacles to the trial, pave the way for uninterrupted selection of the jury beginning next week and thereafter smooth sailing into the issues of the case.

Original plans called for selection of the jury first and argument on the motion to dismiss afterward. John U. Neal, senior defense counsel, said today he believed the plans credited to Darrow would be followed.

Bryan's Son Aids
William Jennings Bryan, Jr., arrived at noon from Los Angeles, to join the prosecution staff. He is making his home with his father at the Rodgers cottage.

Darrow, Neal, Dudley Field Malone of the defense counsel and Arthur Garfield May of the American Civil Liberties Union, will hold a conference tonight to settle the defense strategy in the case.

William Jennings Bryan was active today. He made one speech, the third since his arrival Tuesday, and issued a statement. His speech was to the local board of education and dealt with the relation of religion and education. His statement warned teachers that the case involved serious issues for them.

The first of the 50 scientific witnesses for the defense was to arrive late today. He was Dr. William Goldsmith, biologist of the University of Kansas, author of several books on the conflict of evolution and religion.

Wilbur A. Nelson, former state geologist of Tennessee, opponent of the anti-evolution law, will arrive tomorrow.

Believed Yacht Is Lost In Middle of Pacific

SANTA MONICA, Cal., July 9.—Amateur radio reception here today indicated the yacht Eloise, entrained in the Pacific coast 5,000 mile race, was lost and an SOS has been broadcast for assistance.

The Eloise sailed from San Francisco recently with the yachts Mariner, Idalia and Shawnee.

The radio messages were picked up here by Kenneth Kirkhart, who talked several minutes with the wireless operator on the Idalia, in port at Papeete on the island of Tahiti.

The Mariner, according to the Idalia's operator, won the race. The Idalia was second and the Shawnee third.

Grave fear was expressed for the safety of those on board the Eloise.

Entire Century Drive Will be Open Saturday

Mercury Reaches 106, Sun
Shriveling Corn

KANSAS CITY, Mo., July 9.—Scattered showers brought only slight relief to sweltering Kansas and western Missouri today. Yesterday the mercury soared to 106 in some places in Kansas and to 109 in Kansas City.

Heat prostrations were reported from Kansas towns and several were overcome here.

The corn crop in Kansas is fast burning up under the blazing sun.

DALLAS, Texas, July 9.—Partly cloudy weather in some sections of the state, with promise of clearing skies during the day, held out little prospects of relief from the heat wave of the last 36 hours today.

Temperatures ranged high throughout the state Wednesday, reaching the peak at Fort Worth, where the mercury climbed to 102.

NEW YORK, July 9.—Cooling rains broke the heat spell here last night after four persons were dead and eight overcome by the sweltering blasts of heat.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, July 9.—Persistent showers of the last five days have finally broken the heat wave in Ohio, the United States weather forecaster here said today. Temperatures dropped into the seventies over night.

Refuse to Raise Hands, Girl Killed, Man Hurt

Screwdriver Doesn't Delude
Los Angeles Bandits

Pair Who Have Terrorized Auto
Couples For Last Two
Months Are Sought

LOS ANGELES, July 9.—Refusing to raise their hands at the command of a strange pair of holdup men, Miss Edna M. Kolling, 28, was shot and killed early today and Theodore Stanford, 27, her companion, slightly wounded.

Miss Kolling and Stanford were sitting in an automobile parked in "Lover's lane" when attacked by the bandits in another machine.

Police are looking for a notorious "Mutt and Jeff" pair of highwaymen, distinguished by their disparity in height and believed to have committed the crime. The "Mutt and Jeff" bandits have terrorized automobile couples for months.

Stanford was shot first, according to the story he told at the hospital. "I reached for a screw driver, pretending it was a gun, and tried to convince them I had the drop on them," he said. "The next instant the tall fellow plugged me in the hand."

About the same time his stubby companion shot Miss Kolling in the hand and in the breast.

Block Shepherd Again In Move for Fortune

CHICAGO, July 9.—Today for the third time, a court postponement prevented William D. Shepherd from obtaining the \$1,000,000 McClintock estate.

Although acquitted by a jury of charges that he murdered Billy McClintock, Shepherd has yet another fight on his hands before coming into possession of Billy's fortune.

Several distant cousins have filed a demand that Billy's will be broken on the ground that Shepherd used "undue influence" in getting the boy to sign.

The arguments, which were to have been heard tomorrow, were postponed until Tuesday, July 14.

Few of Investigating Party Refuse Filipino Politicians'
Offer to Provide for Expenses On Visit

The expose resulted when a few members of the party refused to accept the offer of free lodgings and disclosed the secret.

LAVA LAKE BLAZE REPORTED QUELLED

Antelope Mountain Fire Is
Burning Itself Out

The fire reported near Lava lake yesterday, which was finally located as being west of the lake, was reported out by forest service lookouts this morning. Although no report had been received from the men who went to the scene of the fire, the absence of smoke led to the belief that they had succeeded in putting it out.

Six men are watching the fire. This fire is reported to be in good shape. The fire near Antelope mountain in the Fremont forest is still under control and is rapidly burning itself out.

The forest service telephone line between Elk lake and Bachelor butte is expected to be restored to first class condition today, with four rangers working on it. Until now it has been possible for the forest office in Bend to call Bachelor butte, but the lookout there could not call the office or other lookout stations. This was caused by grounding of the wire in the deep snows.

U. S. Shipping Board Will Ask New Offers

WASHINGTON, July 9.—The shipping board today rejected the recommendation of President Palmer of the Emergency Fleet corporation to accept the bid of \$1,350,000 by the Boston Iron and Metal company of Baltimore, for the 200 shipping board vessels to be scrapped.

The board, as proposed in the last paragraph of the advertisement for bids, instructed Admiral Palmer to continue negotiations until July 16, when a final decision will be made.

CATTLE THEFT CASE WILL GO TO U. S. COURT

Gooderham Bound Over,
Bail Set at \$1,000

CLAIMS ALL BLAME

Indian Service Men Doubt
Story of Driving 61
Range Animals

Harry Gooderham, charged separately by Ernest Wiley and F. A. Hutto, of the grazing department of the Indian service, with theft of cattle from Amie Ball, Klamath Indian, was bound over to the federal grand jury this afternoon by United States Commissioner H. C. Ellis. Bail was set at \$5,000 in each of the two cases.

Gooderham was arrested Tuesday morning in Bend, after the cattle had been taken into the sheriff's custody at the Allen ranch. The band at that time included 61 head, belonging to William Kittredge, William Lane and others in addition to the Indian.

Hearing was waived by Gooderham, but he was questioned by Commissioner Ellis in regard to his story that none of the men who had been driving the cattle were implicated in the theft.

Going to Weed from his home in Portland to work in the woods, Gooderham became discouraged because he could not get the sort of job he wanted, so he went to the reservation and stole the cattle, driving them to Willow creek. He had rented a horse at Kirk.

Then he came to Bend, borrowed money on the cattle from the First National bank, and hired three men to help him drive them north.

Gooderham, in reply to the commissioner's expressed doubt as to the truth of this, said that he could prove through A. L. Saye, local taxidermist.

C. E. Convention Scores Maneuvers of U.S. Navy

Awaken Suspicion of Peace-
ful Intentions, Declared

Coolidge Commended for Refusing
To Sanction Armistice Day
As Mobilization Date

PORTLAND, July 9.—Recent maneuvers of the United States navy which took a fleet to the Hawaiian islands and Australia were criticized in a resolution adopted here today by the International Christian Endeavor convention.

The resolution did not mention the Hawaiian maneuvers but the reference was obvious. It criticized "naval maneuvers executed at such places and in such ways as to awaken suspicion in the minds of other nations as to the peaceful intentions of the United States."

"It is nothing less than deplorable, if, while we speak sincere words of peace, we really do, our naval and military activities should even appear to prove our insincerity."

Another resolution was passed which "heartily" commended President Coolidge for "refusing to sanction the use of Armistice day as a mobilization day."

The paper, however, endorsed the president's suggestion to "mobilize the patriotic sentiment and strength of our people on the Fourth of July."

Commercial Sunday sports and amusements were condemned here today in a resolution unanimously adopted by the international Christian Endeavor convention.

The resolution declared in favor of "Sunday rest laws." It called on Christians everywhere "to better Sabbath observance and to work for such observance."

Name Mail Order Firm In Bankruptcy Action

CHICAGO, July 9.—An involuntary petition in bankruptcy was filed in federal court here today against the Phillipsborn Mail Order company, large Chicago firm. The petition declares that liabilities of the company are more than \$1,000,000 and assets about \$750,000. Appointment of a receiver was asked.

Three creditor firms, A. F. Cobean company, Albert Pick and company and Philip Cohen company, filed suit in behalf of many other creditors, it was stated.

According to the petition the Phillipsborn firm has operated at a loss for several months.

Federal Judge Dies After Charge Is Made

Judge Ross left his home for an early morning ride, saying little to friends or relatives.

An hour later motorists saw the wrecked car where it had plunged off a bridge. The body was taken to his home.

Deschutes County's Birth Rate Highest In State

Expert Speaking at Homemakers Institute Praises Eugenics Law, Blames Governor for Stopping Funds

(Special to The Bend Bulletin)
REDMOND, July 9.—Deschutes county has little race suicide for the birth rate is the highest in the state. This was the statement made here yesterday by Dr. William Levin of the state board of health in talking to the homemakers attending the institute being held here. Any complacency which might have been felt by the homemakers after this statement was removed when the speaker reminded them that although he was not acquainted with the situation here it was an established fact that the unfit reproduced much faster than the fit.

"I wish that I were a millionaire," said Dr. Levin, "and I would take all of the population of Oregon, a few at a time through the state institutions at Salem and Pendleton—the home for the feeble minded and the hospital for the insane."

"Oregon has one for every 1,000 population in one of these institutions; perhaps the rest of the country is crazier than Oregon, for it has one for every three of four hundred of population."

"A marked similarity exists between the seed the farmer sows and the crops he reaps; just as with health, we reap what we sow. And the Oregon eugenics law is one of the good seeds of health which we have sown but which the governor hindered by stopping the appropriation."

For every 1,000 births in Oregon, seven mothers die, and these deaths are "useless and preventable," the speaker declared.

Japanese and English
Are Angered

FIX RESPONSIBILITY

Great Britain to Leave Chi-
na Only In Conjunction
With Other Powers

LONDON, July 9.—The entire Peking diplomatic corps, investigating the Shanghai shooting by foreign police, has decided that a British police officer, the British chief of police and the American chairman of the Shanghai municipal council were at least partially to blame for the affair, it was learned authoritatively today.

It was emphasized that the whole diplomatic corps—not a commission of three, as reported earlier—had made this decision. This meant that British and Japanese were represented and it was said that presumably the British minister's views coincided with those of his colleagues.

BOND STREET WORK SHOWING PROGRESS

Excavation Hastened, Build-
ings Rise Rapidly

Brick work on the new building being put up on Bond street by the Bond Street Investment Company, Anton Aune and S. A. Blakley will be finished this week.

The work of building the roof, which was started this week by E. P. Brosternhouse, general contractor for the building, will be finished some time next week.

Lathing, plastering and putting in the interior woodwork and glass fronts will start soon, assuring an early completion of the building.

Excavation work for the new building being put up on the corner of Bond street and Minnesota avenue by Louis Bennett is being rushed to completion and will probably be finished next week. Rock and dirt excavation is being handled by W. H. May and Albert Wright.

As soon as the excavation is finished, foundations and brick work will be started by A. E. Friberg, general contractor for the building. Brick and other materials for this work are assembled on the building site ready for the actual construction work to start.

Two rooms of the new building, which will cover the entire 50 by 140 lot, will be occupied by the Square Deal furniture company. One of the rooms will face Bond street and the other will face an entrance on Minnesota avenue. Tenants for the other three rooms in the building have not yet been announced.
