

WHEAT YIELD LOOMS BIGGER

Little of Last Crop Left On Farms

Corn Production May Be Considerably In Excess of That of 1925

WASHINGTON, July 9.—The condition of all wheat in the United States on July 1 was 73.4 per cent, forecasting a total production this year of 680,000,000 bushels, the department of agriculture estimated today.

This compares with a condition of 73.2 per cent on June 1, when the forecast was for 661,000,000 bushels and 75 per cent on July 1, last year when 875,000,000 bushels were produced.

The yield per acre this year was estimated at 12.6 bushels, compared with 16.1 last year and a five year average of 13.9.

Wheat remaining on farms on July 1 was estimated at 13.4 per cent of last year's crop, or about 29,705,000 bushels and compared with 30,880,000 bushels, on the same date last year.

The acreage of all wheat is 53,994,000—99.6 per cent of last year's acreage.

The condition of winter wheat on July 1 was 65.9 per cent, forecasting a production of 404,000,000 bushels, compared with an estimate of 407,000,000 bushels on June 1 and a production last year of 590,000,000 bushels.

The yield per acre was estimated at 12.3 bushels, compared with 16.2 last year and a five year average of 14.7.

The condition of spring wheat on July 1 was 88.1 per cent forecasting a production of 270,000,000 compared with an estimate of 254,000,000 bushels on June 1 and a production last year of 283,000,000 bushels. The yield per acre was estimated at 13 bushels, compared with 15.9 last year and a five year average of 12.3.

The condition of corn on July 1 was 86.4 per cent, forecasting a production of 3,095,000,000 bushels compared with a production last year of 2,437,000,000 bushels and a five year average of 2,935,000,000 bushels.

The yield per acre of corn was estimated at 29 bushels and the acreage was placed at 106,621,000, or 101.5 per cent of last year's acreage.

Other estimates included: Oats, July 1 conditions, 76.3 per cent; forecast production, 1,292,000,000 bushels, compared with June 1 estimate of 1,285,000,000 bushels and last year's estimate of 1,542,000,000 bushels; estimated yield per acre, 29.1 bushels, compared with 36.3 last year and a five year average of 31.3 bushels.

The Philippine Herald, a native daily, said "the story is calculated to embarrass our visitors by deliberately misrepresenting the nature of a friendly social obligation voluntarily imposed. The implication that politicians are scheming to influence the minds of the visitors regarding independence is vicious and unwarranted."

The Times, an American daily, said "The visit of the Americans is a mere courtesy call, not calling for the expenditure of money for Philippine propaganda purposes. It is poor strategy to attempt to convert democrats to the independence cause who are already converted. 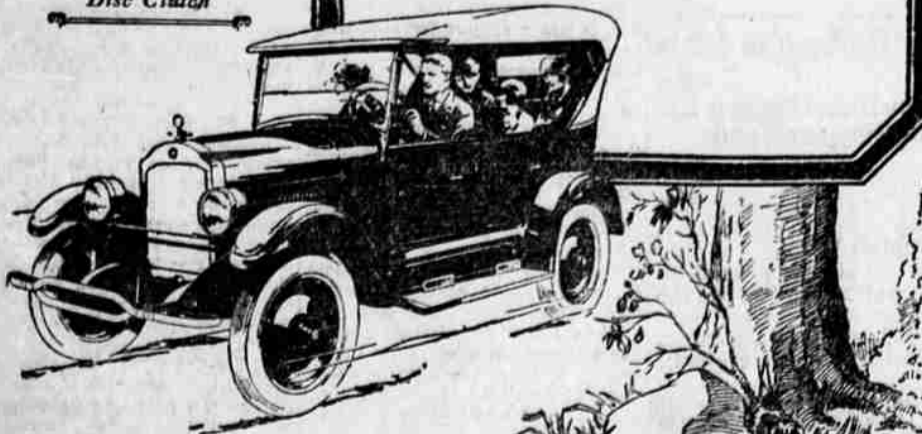
