

SLASHING FIRE UNDER CONTROL IN NIGHT FIGHT

Brooks-Scanlon Timber Threatened

LARGE CREW IS USED

Eighty Men From Camps and Section Gangs Guard Standing Pines

Fire which yesterday threatened standing timber of the Brooks-Scanlon Lumber Co. was brought under control during the night and was being held in check today.

The fire started at noon yesterday, about a mile east of Brooks-Scanlon camp No. 2, about 14 miles southeast of Bend in the Arnold ice cave country, and swept three miles south before it was controlled, cutting a swath about a quarter of a mile wide through the slashings.

As high as 80 men were called out to fight the flames, including the entire crews of camps 2 and 3 and the section and steel gangs from camp 1. Sixty men patrolled the fire today to guard against further spreading of the flames and possible damage to live timber.

Other fires quelled
Except for the expense of fighting the fire, which was considerable, the lumber company suffered no loss, although the fire burned to the very edge of standing timber.

The lava lake fire, from which no smoke could be seen by lookouts yesterday, was definitely reported out today when firemen returned from the scene of the fire.

Smoke rising from the northeast side of the Paulina mountains was reported by a forest service lookout at dusk last night. Fireman Brown went from the Pine Mountain ranger station to investigate this blaze, which was thought to be in the vicinity of Cinder hill. Up to a late hour this afternoon no report had been received from him and lookouts were unable to detect the smoke today.

TWO RESCUE CHILD FROM CRAZED SIRE

Then Coos Deputy Has to Warm Milk for Infant

MARSHFIELD, Ore., July 11.—Courage of two Coos county deputy sheriffs removed the need of shooting Otto Frederickson, demented South Slough rancher, yesterday, when officers were called to rescue the year old infant held captive by the father after he had terrorized the neighborhood with his rifle.

He made no objections when the officers boldly entered the house for a drink, and soon the officers were between him and his rifle.

Deputy Malehorn's work was not complete, however, for the infant was hungry and crying. He pocketed his .45 and proceeded to warm up some milk for the youngster.

Frederickson was brought to Marshfield city hall last night and is to be examined today for his sanity.

More Furniture Makers Fined Under Trust Law

CHICAGO, July 10.—Eighty-two furniture manufacturers today pleaded guilty to violation of the Sherman anti-trust law and were fined in amounts totalling \$186,000.

Those pleading guilty today were manufacturers of household furniture and case goods. Manufacturers of chairs and refrigerators pleaded guilty previously.

The fines imposed today brought the total amount since the government started its investigation of the furniture industry to \$420,000.

Project Backers Blue Over Work's Attitude

Owyhee and Vale Get Little Encouragement

State Aid for Settlers' Condition, Pierce Passes Responsibility to Legislature

ONTARIO, Ore., July 10.—Having spread a pall of disappointment over Eastern Oregon by his negative attitude towards reclamation, Secretary of the Interior Herbert Work left today for Idaho, where more troubled irrigation affairs await his consideration.

Secretary Work had intended to remain through Saturday inspecting the three Oregon projects—Baker, Owyhee and Vale—but he cut his time short on each.

Anxiety over the situation in Idaho was partly responsible for his hasty departure, but Secretary Work was very skeptical about the Oregon projects and indicated work on at least two—the Owyhee and Vale projects—would be delayed indefinitely, at least until the state is ready to pledge financial aid to settlers.

Governor Pierce indicated in conference that this was up to the legislature and not to him, although he urged that the government start work early on all three projects.

The Baker project seemed to have the best chance of being started at an early date. Work agreed to consider certification of the work, for which appropriation has been made without qualification.

Fifth Auto Wreck Victim Dies As Result of Hurts

SPOKANE, July 10.—John Olson, 6, the fifth victim of a crash between the Inland Electric Line train and an automobile at Freeman last week, died in a local hospital late yesterday. Mrs. Henry Olson and three children were killed outright in the mishap.

John Fry, 26, a brother of Vera Fry, one of the victims, was taken into custody by authorities because he was said to have become insane brooding over the mishap.

Expert Says Montana Shock Only An After-quake

Tumbler Lasting for Thirty Seconds Recorded—People Terrified But No Damage Is Done

WASHINGTON, July 10.—The Montana earth tremor was recorded on the Georgetown university seismograph here from 9:56 a. m. to 10:15 a. m. today.

Father Tondorf, seismograph expert, declared it was a minor shock known as an "after quake" resulting from the recent serious earth upheaval there.

"We will be having those for months to come," Father Tondorf said. "There is nothing to worry about because they can do no damage."

GREAT FALLS, Mont., July 10.—An earthquake shock lasting about 30 seconds shook the Big Belt mountain district at 7:45 a. m. today.

The shocks apparently centered between White Sulphur Springs and Three Forks, the area which suffered most from the severe quakes which began on the night of June 27.

No serious damage was reported, although the quakes were felt distinctly at Lombard, Manhattan, Logan, in the Gallatin valley, and other points as far north as White Sulphur Springs.

People were momentarily terrified and hastened from buildings into the open.

THREE FORKS, Mont., July 10.—A slight earthquake was felt in this vicinity at 7:45 a. m. today.

It was distinct but did no damage. So far as was learned, the shock was not experienced over any great area.

Trains Detour

LIVINGSTON, Mont., July 10.—Detours were completed here today to permit the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul passenger and freight trains to return to their own tracks for the first time since the earthquake that shook Montana on the night of June 27.

The quake tipped two cliffs over the old road bed and caved in the Lombard tunnel.

Landslides created a small lake, through which trestles had to be built. It will be months before the old roadbed can be opened. Milwaukee trains have been routed over the Northern Pacific tracks from Miles City to Sappington, 334 miles, since the earthquake.

EXECUTE THREE IN CALIFORNIA FOR ONE DEATH

State Exacts Penalty for Officer's Murder

SPECTATORS FAINT

Boys Calm as They Face Gallows at San Quentin Prison This Morning

The state of California today claimed the list lives of three youths, legal retribution for the murder of Patrolman Glenn Bond of Los Angeles, February 20, 1924.

On the double gallows at San Quentin prison, Lewis Perry, 19, and Tom Bailey, 22, were hanged at 11:02 a. m. Ten minutes later physicians stepped down from the stools in front of the two blue clad forms and pronounced them dead.

Two hours and a half later, in the gallows room of Folsom penitentiary, Ed Montijo, 24, who participated in the robbery in which Bond was killed, went to his death.

The Folsom trap was sprung at 1:31 p. m., and Montijo was declared dead 11 minutes later.

FOLSOM PENITENTIARY, Folsom, Cal., July 10.—Ed Montijo, youthful accomplice in the murder of Glenn Bond, Los Angeles policeman, was hanged here this afternoon.

Third Pays Penalty
The trap was sprung at 1:31. Montijo was declared dead at 1:42 p. m.

The hour of execution, originally set for 10 a. m., was set back three hours and a half to allow counsel for the condemned boy to make a last minute attempt to save him from the noose.

Husband Asks Damages, Says Wife Fooled Him

Case At Portland Centers About Adopted Infant

Steamship Pilot, Plaintiff In Action Against Hospital, Sues For \$40,000

PORTLAND, July 10.—Two years ago Mrs. Charles E. Buchanan of Raymond, Wash., took a baby boy home from a Portland hospital and told her husband that the infant was their own son.

Today Buchanan, a steamship pilot, filed suit in circuit court here for \$40,000 damages against his wife and authorities at the women's hospital, alleging that they entered into a conspiracy to fool him.

He said the baby was the child of Mr. and Mrs. G. Mension, poor people who could not support it. They turned the baby over soon after birth to Mrs. Buchanan in answer to a want ad, he alleges. He said his wife wanted to make him think she could bear him a son. He didn't find out about the deception until a short time ago.

ESTATE DISPUTING OWNERSHIP OF CAR

Brook Would Get Auto Taken by City for Fine

Ownership of an automobile which the city of Bend claims to have received in lieu of part of a fine in municipal court, was under dispute in a case being tried in Justice E. D. Gibson's court this afternoon.

Frank N. Brook, administrator of the estate of Chester H. Brook, is seeking to recover the car, which is in the possession of Chief of Police P. J. Hanson, claiming that it is part of the estate.

The plaintiff, through Attorney Ross Farnham, claims that the city has no record of having received the car in lieu of value, and that it had no right to take personal property in lieu of a fine. City Attorney C. S. Benson is representing Chief Hanson, who is the nominal defendant.

Penalty For Contempt Will Not be Enforced

CHARLESTON, W. Va., July 10.—Van A. Bitner, international representative of the United Mine Workers, will not begin serving a six months' jail sentence for contempt of court tomorrow.

Bitner was granted a writ of error and supersedeas by Judge M. L. Litz of the state supreme court of appeals here late today, only a few hours before he was scheduled to board a train for Morgantown.

The union representative was sentenced in connection with mine union activities in the present disturbances in the northern West Virginia fields. Bitner's \$500 fine was remitted, but he will have to pay \$300 court costs.

CHINESE POLICY TO BE SETTLED AT SWAMPSCOTT

Coolidge Calls Heads of State Department

CONFERENCE LOOMS

Must Decide Whether America Should Yield to the Powers Advising Delay

(U. P. Leased Wire to The Bend Bulletin)
WASHINGTON, July 10.—President Coolidge has hurriedly summoned Secretary of State Kellogg from St. Paul, Minn., and Under Secretary of State Grew from Washington to the summer White House at Swampscott to confer on the Chinese situation which has suddenly taken a turn for the worse.

In a week end conference beginning tomorrow, the president and the state department chiefs will make the critical decision on whether the United States is to stand on its demands for an immediate Chinese conference or submit to the pressure of Great Britain and other powers for delay.

With anti foreign sentiment rising rapidly in China, threatening further violent outbreaks, any long delay by the foreign powers in replying to China's unanswered note demanding treaty revision and apologies for the Shanghai affair, is considered dangerous.

This government is now insisting, through its representatives in Peking, London, Paris and Tokyo, that those powers signatory to resolution No. 5 of the Washington arms conference providing for a Chinese conference to consider Chinese extra-territoriality, make good their promise now by calling such a conference.

Camper Draws \$10 Fine Because He Left Fire

A. C. Johnson of Hood River was fined \$10 by County Judge R. W. Sawyer this afternoon when he admitted leaving a camp fire burning about one-fourth mile northeast of the East lake hotel on the afternoon of July 5.

The fire had spread over seven or eight square feet under some small trees and in the end of a rotten log when it was found by Ranger Ben Smith of the Port Rock district.

Within an hour the fire could have gotten into a jack pine thicket and spread to serious proportions, according to information furnished by Ranger Smith.

LOS ANGELES, July 10.—American children are not spanked enough—they should get more of the good old fashioned whippings in the family woodshed, Mrs. Bertha A. Bennett, Milwaukee, told delegates to the International Kindergarten union in annual session here today.

"Our trouble with older children comes from the freedom allowed them in their kindergarten days," Mrs. Bennett said.

"Teachers as a result follow instead of lead the children. If mothers used the strap more their youngsters would be easier to control after they have reached the flapper and sheik stage."

Miss Anne Lecuyer, delegate from Switzerland, blamed the "American flapper system" for unhappy marriages. "You Americans marry too young," she said. "It amuses me to see school children running around with wives and husbands. In Switzerland men seldom marry until they are nearly 30 and the women wait at least until they are 21."

Diversion of Alcohol Is Charge Against 53

PHILADELPHIA, July 10.—Fifty firms and 48 individuals were indicted by the federal grand jury here today for illegal diversion of alcohol. The indictments climax a five months investigation into bootlegging activities. Hundreds of thousands of gallons of alcohol, allegedly withdrawn illegally from government and private warehouses, have been shipped throughout the country for distribution to distillers and bootleggers, according to investigators.

The investigation was made by a "mystery squad" of government operatives, the presence of which in the city was unknown even to dry officials until 10 days ago.

PORTLAND DOLLS UP

Purple and White Dominant Color In Preparation for National Meeting

PORTLAND, July 10.—Portland dressed itself up today in purple and white to welcome the antlered herds of Elks to the national grand lodge reunion which formally opens Monday.

However, the city was none too early for Jackson, Mich., from where a special train rolled into the city this morning bringing scores of "Bills."

Jackson Bills First

Jackson Elks were the first to set foot on Portland's hospitable soil. But one Jacksonian declared that was nothing, "for Jackson is going to be first in everything."
