

Bend Swimmers To Concentrate On Life Saving Work

STANDARD TEST WILL BE GIVEN

Swimmers from 12 to 17 Eligible

Concentration on life saving work is being urged by the instructors at the gymnasium swimming tank, upon all who use the tank, with a view to encouraging all who know how to swim to go a step further and learn how to save others.

The Red Cross beginners' and swimmers' tests will be given during the regular class periods to all who attend them.

The junior life saving course will be given on Thursdays to boys from 2 to 3 o'clock, girls from 3 to 4. All swimmers between the ages of 12 and 17 are eligible.

The senior life saving course, open to those over 17, will be given Wednesdays from 9 to 10 p. m. for women and Thursdays during the same hour for men.

Six hours of supervised instruction is necessary to take either the junior or senior tests. It is important that all six lessons be attended as no others will be given unless arranged for beforehand.

The tests will be given by a board of examiners to be selected later.

Oregon to Pay \$225,000 For Using Patent Paving

FEW WILL CREDIT DEMPSEY STORIES

New Report of Wills Match Thought "Publicity"

 NEW YORK, July 10.—Revival of the reports that Tex Rickard is negotiating for a heavyweight championship fight between Jack Dempsey and Harry Wills, to be held late this summer, were looked upon today in boxing circles as "some one looking for publicity."

Rickard and Paddy Mullins, the silent manager of the negro challenger, had a talk yesterday, after which Mullins said, "I guess it will be all right."

Rickard said, "We agreed on terms," but he did not mention whether they agreed on the price of a carload of apples or a bull dog from the noted Mullins kennel.

Some thought that Rickard made a move to warn rival promoters that he was first in line for the fight if the New York boxing commission should succeed in getting Dempsey to sign an agreement to accept the negro's challenge.

Humbert Furazzy, who made such a success of the recent Italian hospital fund card, has been hinting that he was going into the promoting business on a large scale and it is understood that he has secured the boxing privilege for the Brooklyn baseball park, which has been the scene of several losing ventures.

LEGION MEN FIGHT STATE COMMISSION

Refusal of Boxing Permit to Post Starts Trouble

 SAN FRANCISCO, July 10.—Golden Gate post No. 49, American Legion, was on record here today with resolutions which promise to be the opening gun of war on the "state athletic commission's control of state boxing."

Golden Gate post was refused a boxing permit and its resolution charges discrimination against the legion and favoritism to private promoters. Executive meetings of the commission also were scored.

Copies of the resolution will be forwarded to other posts, with a request that the legion generally support action of the local post, it was declared by Dr. Walter E. Holl, chairman of the boxing commission of Golden Gate post.
