

\$600,000 CITY WATER BOND ELECTION AUTHORIZED BY COUNCIL FOR JULY 22

MURDER THRILL MOTIVE BEHIND DEATH ALLEGED

Son of Wealthy Family Is Sought

EVIDENCE GATHERED

Cards Found In Pocket of Dead Man—Letters Show Morbidity Yearning

MINEOLA, N. Y., July 11.—An amazing chain of circumstantial evidence against Philip K. Knapp, army deserter and son of a wealthy Syracuse, N. Y., family, who is alleged to have committed murder for the murder thrill that inspired the Leopold crime, will be presented to a special grand jury on July 17.

District Attorney Charles R. Weeks of Nassau county said today he would summon the jury to convene on that date and consider the sensational allegations against the former Cornell and Columbia student, who is sought by police and military authorities in connection with the murder on July 4 of Louis Panella, taxi driver.

Whether insane or diabolically clever, the young man, son of a prominent Syracuse family, appears, according to the police, to be bent upon a lust for thrills.

Already he has left behind him the widow and children of Louis Panella, hard working taxi driver and friend of the air men at Mineola flying field. Panella was found dead July 4, his body buried beneath slabs of cement in a trench near the field. In his pocket were cards of Knapp. The police believe these cards were placed there by Knapp, in the belief that by the time the body was recovered, it would be so decomposed that identification would be impossible and the cards would lead the authorities to believe that it was Knapp's body that had been unearthed.

Army Revolver Missing
A foot of the victim, however, protruded from the crude grave, disclosing the gruesome murder too soon. The bullet which caused his death was found to have been fired from an army revolver, and such a revolver was found to be missing from Knapp's barracks quarters, having disappeared at the same time as Knapp did.

These circumstances, coupled with Knapp's cards on the body, set the authorities in search of the missing cadet. A warrant for his arrest was issued today and the police are confident the chase will find him, dead or alive, before many days have passed.

His, however, is a mind yearning for the great thrill. He had not found it, he explained in letters, in any of his exploits and experiences to date. This is believed by police to have been the motive for his crime.

Floyd Hall Guilty, Is Verdict After 22 Hours

LUMBERING TOWNS MENACED BY FIRES

Sternsville Is Surrounded By Flames

HOQUIAM, Wash., July 11.—Two Grays harbor lumber towns were today threatened by a forest fire—one of them completely shut off by a wall of flames; one logging camp was completely destroyed without loss of life and 199 fighters are still combatting the flames.

Strenuous all night efforts of volunteers saved the two towns last night but they are still menaced. Long distance in telephone communication is being maintained with the towns and citizens of both Sternsville and Carlisle, the threatened villages, are staying by their homes. The fire started from a burner in the Ajax Shingle company's mill half a mile east of Aloha yesterday and soon spread beyond control. It swept through green timber and completely surrounded Sternsville. The entire country side turned out to save their homes, none of them fleeing for safety, according to messages coming in here today.

One hundred fire fighters, headed by three state wardens, labored all yesterday afternoon and most of the night, making a successful stand against the fire for the time being when it was but half a mile from Carlisle. The fire is eating into a fine stand of green timber of the Carlisle-Pennell Logging company and still threatening the little logging village.

Poultrymen of Oregon Will Meet This Month

County Agent W. T. McDonald has received notice of the Oregon poultrymen's convention, which is to be held at Corvallis July 22, 23 and 24. Farmers attending the meeting will find camping, dormitory or hotel accommodations, he mentions.

Professor W. A. Lippincott, formerly of Kansas, but for the past few years head of the poultry department of the University of California, a national authority, will take part in the program and confer with poultrymen. Dr. W. T. Johnson, poultry veterinarian at Puyallup, Washington, will also take part in the program. President Durkee of the Pacific Cooperative Poultry Producers' association will discuss cooperative marketing. Professor Hyalop will explain methods of growing alfalfa for poultry green feed. Lectures and demonstrations on cutting, caponizing, killing and dressing fowls will be given by A. G. Lunn, F. L. Knowlton, F. E. Fox and H. E. Cosby of the college staff. Ponzi Gets Nine Years On Charges of Larceny

BOSTON, July 11.—Charles Ponzi, famous bushel basket millionaire, was sentenced today to seven to nine years in state prison on four counts of larceny, by Judge James A. Sisk of Suffolk county superior court.

The larceny indictments grew out of Ponzi's financial operations here several years ago when he dealt on a huge scale in International Reply coupons, promising them 50 per cent profits in 90 days.

Pending an appeal to the supreme court, stay of sentence was granted until Monday, when Ponzi will be required to renew a bail of \$10,000 under which he is now at liberty.

Smoke Haze May Hamper Lookouts, Fear

Big forest fires west of the Cascades will add to the week end fire danger in the Deschutes forest, if the smoke from these conflagrations blows across the mountains, it was pointed out today by Supervisor H. L. Plumb. The smoke would mask local fires and prevent their early detection.

Employees of the Deschutes forest are "on their toes" today for every sign of fire, for the humidity is dangerously low and it is almost a miracle, Plumb declares, that no fires have gotten away in the last few days. No fires were burning in the forest area up to noon today.

On account of the low humidity and the additional danger on account of the smoke from the Willamette valley, people who go to the woods over the week end are asked to be especially careful with fire.

Cascaden was a miner and had come to Bend in search of work in the mills. It was while on this quest that a train ran into him and caused his injuries.

According to local physicians the man had recovered from his accident and had made a trip to Portland to get an artificial leg, when he became ill again and was taken to Mrs. Lesh's under county care. He became steadily worse until the time of his death.

Except that he was a native of Wisconsin, little is known about the man here. When questioned concerning his relatives he always replied that he had none.

Officers Seek Source Of Arsenic In Sugar

Poison Found In Home of Janitor at Stanford

"Powdered Sugar," Suspected, Chemical Analysis Reveals Deadly Nature

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Cal., July 11.—Arsenic in sufficient quantity to have been fatal to 50 persons was discovered today in sugar bowls in the university janitors' quarters.

Discovery of the poison plot came when a kitchen attendant noted that the sugar bowls had been changed from their usual locations.

Examination showed what appeared to be powdered sugar, sprinkled over the other sugar. The bowls were turned over to the medical department of the university, where an analysis determined the strange powder was arsenic.

Sheriff's deputies and the police of Palo Alto are working on the case, and a finger print expert is endeavoring to get clues from the bowls.

Secret of Bank Funds Dies With Defaulter

KANSAS CITY, Mo., July 11.—Joseph R. Gant, defaulting president of the Metropolis bank, died at his father's home here early today, taking with him the secret of what happened to \$620,000 of the bank's funds.

Gant had been ill since last November when the bank was closed and he was arrested. The banker was charged with embezzlement and forgery and was released under \$50,000 bond. He was never brought to trial because of his illness.

ISLE ROYALE, Mich., July 11.—Lying on a cot in the hold of the steamship America surrounded by cakes of ice, L. J. Chapman, wealthy dairyman of Kansas City, arrived here today, seeking the "coolest spot in the United States."

Chapman's journey from Kansas City, where he was a heat victim, in a refrigerator car, cooled by 16,000 pounds of ice, has caused considerable interest here. A large crowd met the steamship when it docked today.

I am having lots of fun and so far the neighbors have not complained. You will never hear me play in any concerts but I am enjoying it.

Don't Worry, Advised

"Don't worry. It causes high blood pressure. I have never been able to save money and have worried a lot about what I would do when I got too old to work. Finally I just decided that I could not hope to save money, so I decided that having worked all my life in the same town I could go to the poor house. I knew lots of people out there, and so I quit worrying about what I'd do when I got old. It was all settled. I'd go to the poor house. Since then I have managed to save enough to buy a farm and when I get old I can live there and raise potatoes. If that won't work I can still go to the poor house.
