Big Fires Add to Peril Here, Warning Given

the holdings of the Crown Willamette Paper company on Young's river near the base of Saddle mountain. Reports this morning declared it had burned over nearly 600 acres of cut over land and was still raging, out of all control. As yet the flames have not reached green timber and have spared donkey engines standing in the forest. One of the buildings at Camp No. 4 of the Crown Willamette operations was destroyed by the flames Friday afternoon. The blaze was detected by the fire lookout on Saddle mountain about 1 p. m. Friday. He immediately warned the men at Camp No. 5. An investigation revealed that the flames were raging wildly and entirely out of control. A call for help was put on the wire and the Crown Willamette company started mobilizing its forces throughout the lower Columbia river district. Ray Tipple, logging superintendent for the company hurried from Cathlamet.

Call for Men Issued

With W. H. Ballinger, in charge at Young's River falls, he attempted to marshal a fire fighting force in Astoria, but was successful in getting only eight men. A call for reinforcements was sent to Cathlamet and 20

men were brought from there by special ferry and bus, bringing the number on the fire line to 40 this morning. Early reports today from the fire zone said that, while conditions this morning were far better than last night, due to heavy, damp air, the fire was still far beyond control. It fired thus far to be warm and bright the situation will become very serious.

Native of Switzerland Dies In Prineville, 85

PRINEVILLE, July 11.—Arnold R. Von Weisenflue, father of Mrs. W. P. Hershey of this city, passed away at the home of his daughter in Prineville Thursday morning, following an illness of 10 months.

Funeral services were to be held today in Walla Walla, where the body was shipped from here Friday morning. Interment will be made in the family plot, Mountain View cemetery.

Von Weisenflue is survived by a daughter, Mrs. Hershey, three granddaughters, Mrs. Ralph N. Seely and Miss Ina Williams of San Diego, and Mrs. A. T. Monner of Gateway. A daughter, Frances, preceded him many years ago, and his wife, Helen Marr, died in 1915.

Von Weisenflue was born in Meiringen, Switzerland, 85 years ago, coming to this country when only seven years of age. He spent most of his younger life in Scranton, Pennsylvania, Philadelphia and New York City. In 1882 he came to Montana where he owned and operated two of the first newspapers in the Bitter Root valley. He made his home in Central Oregon for the past 14 years, coming to Prineville some five years ago.

Von Weisenflue was a Mason and an Odd Fellow for over 60 years, being at this time a charter member of Madras A. F. & A. M., and also a charter member of Garden Valley lodge I. O. O. F. of Stevedale, Montana.

To Take New Rowboat For Use of Boy Scouts

Boy scouts encamped at Scout lake this summer will have a new rowboat to add to the joys of camp life.

This was announced yesterday when Bernard Morse, scout executive, returned from Redmond with the information that the new boat being built there by P. D. Hance will be ready to be taken to the scout camp early next week in time for the camp opening. Several Redmond merchants contributed materials for the boat and Hance did the work on it without pay.

Myron Symons and his son, Norman, together with Ralph Grimes and Jim Sullivan of troop No. 1 and John Deer of troop No. 4 spent Thursday at Scout lake and put in part of the day repairing the boat to the lake. A man and team were there to do the necessary hauling. The party at the lake sighted two deer.

Supplies for the scout encampment will be taken to the lake Monday by Morse and Northrup, the cook.

Redmond will send nine boys to the camp and Madras six, making a total now signed up to go between

35 and 40. There will be accommodations for 45 boys or more and Scout Executive Morse expects to secure that number before the camp is opened.
