STOCK MARKET SLIGHTLY WEAK

Fair Business Is Seen In Third Quarter

(Wall Street Journal Financial Review)
NEW YORK, July 11.—A slight weakening took place in Steel, Baldwin, American Can and other leading industrials at the start of the second hour. However, the volume of dealings among pivotal stocks continued small with the principal activity attached to special movements.

Bethlehem was a strong spot in the steel group, selling at 31 1/2, up nearly two points from Friday's low.

Prospects point to fair business in the third quarter and considerable improvement in the final three months of the year.

General Railway Signal reached a new high, advancing 12 points to 8 1/2.

Grain Prices Near Top When Trading Is Ended

CHICAGO, July 11.—Grain futures closed resting firmly at the top of drastic advances on the board of trade today. The closing going checked steady and uninterrupted advances that carried from the opening.

July wheat led, being up 9 cents, the biggest gain in over a month. Distant options were up 6 1/2 cents. Coarse grains made appreciable gains in sympathy with wheat.

Although corn borrowed strength from wheat, there was too the high temperatures to be reckoned with. For the past week, crop deterioration has been reported, due to hot winds. Cash business improved.

Oats advanced under similar circumstances.

Covering by shorts and renewed local buying on the strength of higher hogs and grains, boosted provisions.

Heat Wave Crop Damage Results In Market Rise

CHICAGO, July 11.—Grain prices soared sharply on the Chicago board of trade today. July wheat jumped nine cents; distant future 8 1/2 cents. Coarse grains were sharply higher, principally in sympathy with wheat.

There were many contributing factors to the drastic upturn in wheat, the most important of which was the heat wave that blanketed the country from the Ohio river through Montana to the Canadian northwest.

Crop damage complaints came from the territory in the grip of the heat wave. Cables said foreigners who had overstayed the market in anticipation of lower prices have been forced to come into the pit by extremely low supplies.

Wool Market Is Steady as Foreign Report Favorable

BOSTON, July 11.—The local wool market is steady on the more encouraging advices from abroad. Prices show no material change. Territory and 12 month Texas wools are quotable at \$1.35 to \$1.40 clean, half blood combing \$1.20 to \$1.25, three eighths blood at \$1.05 to \$1.10, and quarter blood at 95 cents to \$1. Australian 64x70's \$1.15 to \$1.20 in bond. Australian sales are expected to open steady, judging from the action of the London auctions.
