

SAYS THEOLOGY HURTS RELIGION

Strife Laid to Narrowness by Burbank

Plant Evolutionist Declares Bryan's Skull of Primitive Type

(U. P. Leased Wire to The Bend Bulletin) SANTA ROSA, Cal., July 13.—Religion and theology are sharply divided with ardent disciples of the latter doing all they can to kill religion. Luther Burbank, world famous plant scientist, told the United Press in an interview at his home here today.

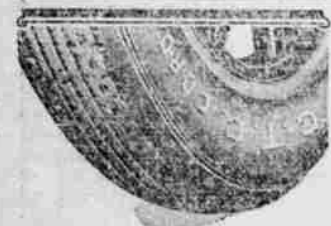
"The attempt is not deliberate, Burbank believes, but it is being done mistakenly "through just such examples of narrowness as evidenced in the issues drawn at the Scopes trial in Dayton."

"Mr. Bryan and his supporters may be sincere, although I hear more and more persons expressing doubt of that sincerity, and even of Mr. Bryan's sanity, but they are certainly doing more to kill religion than are the avowed enemies of the church," Burbank said.

"They are not teaching the truth, but it always prevails, sooner or later. In the meantime they are doing great damage to the cause of religion as represented by the church in America."

Burbank, in private, as in public, is an avowed follower of the evolutionary idea. On the wall of his private studio where a well worn leather couch affords him rest from his work in the evolution of plants, is a chart, one of three in the world, he says, depicting what hereditary evolution means.

"This chart, made by E. T. Smyth, and soon to be published, traced the strains of mankind and startlingly

Bryan Classified
On one end is the I. W. W. and next to it is the idle rich, both parasites, Burbank explained. In the middle of the line lie the valued strains, the scientists, the scholars, the musicians and the public leaders.

As to Bryan and evolution, Burbank sums up the issue in these words: "Mr. Bryan is an honored personal friend of mine, yet this need not prevent the observation that the skull with which nature endowed him visibly approaches the neanderthal type. Feelings and the use of gesticulations and words are more according to the nature of this type than investigation and reflection.

"Those who would legislate against the teaching of evolution should also legislate against gravity, electricity and the unreasonable velocity of light, and also should introduce a clause to prevent the use of the telescope, the microscope and the spectroscope, or any other instrument of precision which may in the future be invented, constructed or used for the discovery of truth."

SHARP RAIN AIDS TO QUENCH FIRES

Saddle Mountain Blaze Controlled at Last

Leased Wire to The Bend Bulletin) ASTORIA, Ore., July 12.—A sharp rain Sunday night gave the upper hand to the 40 fire fighters battling the fire raging in the Crown-Wilamette Paper Company slashings near Saddle mountain and today the fire crew was resting, the fire under complete control and practically out.

At no time did the fire actually burn in green timber and the loss it occasioned was comparatively slight, although for more than 48 hours it threatened the heart of Clatsop county's timber belt.

Saturday evening the flames reached the edge of the green timber and damaged several donkey engines located there, but frenzied efforts of the fire fighters saved the engines from destruction and checked the fire at the edge of the timber.

Two New Busses Are Added For Bend to Eugene Line

Stevens for indemnity for the slaughter of a cow of the appraised value of \$_____, which said cow was slaughtered under the provisions of Chapter 115 of Oregon Laws for 1915, and it now appearing to the Court from said claim and the certificate of the State Veterinarian on file herein that said R. E. Stevens is entitled to the said indemnity in the sum of \$_____, of which Deschutes County is entitled to pay one-half and the balance to be paid by the state, it is therefore ORDERED that the said claim be and the same is hereby audited and allowed, and the county clerk is instructed to issue his warrant in the sum of \$_____ payable to the said Ira Paxton; and it is further ORDERED that the clerk be and he hereby is instructed to certify a copy of this order to the state veterinarian at Salem.

In the Matter of Claim for Indemnity of D. H. Gates.

This matter comes on to be heard on this 1st day of July, 1925, upon the claim of D. H. Gates for indemnity for the slaughter of one cow of the appraised value of \$55, which said cow was slaughtered under the provisions of chapter 215 of laws of Oregon for 1915, and it now appearing to the court from said claim and the certificate of the state veterinarian on file herein that said D. H. Gates is entitled to the said indemnity in the sum of \$14, of which Deschutes county is entitled to pay one half and the balance to be paid by the state; it is therefore ORDERED that the said claim be and the same is hereby audited and allowed, and the county clerk is instructed to issue his warrant in the sum of \$7, payable to the said D. H. Gates; and it is further ORDERED that the clerk be and he hereby is instructed to certify a copy of this order to the state veterinarian at Salem.

In the Matter of State Industrial Insurance.

Deschutes County having accepted the provisions of the amendment to the Workmen's Compensation Law providing industrial accident insurance for all salaried peace officers, and having done so is now obligated to make monthly payments to the Industrial Accident Fund on account of said officers, it is hereby ORDERED that the County Clerk be and he hereby is authorized and directed to issue his warrants monthly to the Industrial Accident Fund of the State of Oregon, in the sum of \$3.00 for each \$100.00 of payroll paid to S. E. Roberts, Sheriff, and George W. Stokoe, Deputy Sheriff, and at the rate of \$1.00 for each \$100.00 of salary paid to Hazel Manton and Carol Boyd; and it is further ORDERED that there be deducted from the wages of each of the said persons named above, beginning with June 1, 1925, the sum of one cent per day, said amount to be forwarded to the Industrial Accident Fund together with the other payments ordered above.

In the Matter of the Bend Flower Show.

ORDERED that a warrant be drawn on the General Fund in the sum of \$75.00, payable to the Secretary of the Bend Civic League, said appropriation being in aid of the Bend Flower Show.

In the Matter of Repairs to Scott Street.

It was then ordered that the County participate in the improvement of Scott Street, a County Road, in an amount not to exceed the sum of \$1,000.00, said amount to be payable after the completion of said work and whenever funds were in hand following the payment for all market road and state highway work to be paid for from the Market Road Fund for which engagements have now been made.

There being no further business to come before the Court, adjournment was then had to Saturday, July 11, 1925, at 2:00 P. M.

U. S. WILL BACK CHINA'S RIGHTS

Swampscott Conferences Outline Policy

Government Must be Conducted to Give Foreigners Protection, However

(U. P. Leased Wire to The Bend Bulletin) SWAMPSCOTT, July 13.—Promises made to China in the Washington conference of 1921 should be kept, is the view of the American government.

At the same time the United States insists China shall take adequate measures to protect foreigners and meet her treaty responsibilities.

This is the United States' policy toward China as developed in conferences of President Coolidge and Secretary of State Kellogg over the week end.

Linked with this policy, the United States favors conferences to adjust customs and to consider the burning question of extra territoriality in China.

It is likely two important conferences of the world powers with China will be summoned in China before the end of the year. The first will consider raising China's tariffs, as agreed at the Washington conference.

Clash Likely
The other conference will probably take up the question of administration of justice by foreign nations in China and extra territoriality activities claimed by China to be in violation of her sovereignty.

The new policy is not in agreement with unofficial reports from Tokio and London that Japan and Great Britain favored postponement of any Chinese conferences on general questions until after the present trouble was quieted.

The American government, however, has received no official word from any of the powers disapproving of immediate calling of the conferences.

Kellogg cancelled his plans to return to St. Paul to continue his vacation and returned today Washington, where he expects to have a busy week over the China problems and the foreign debt question.

Kellogg discussed the "general situation" on debts with the president, he said, but there were no new developments.

Harding said if there was poison present it would probably be several days before it was identified.
