**Dr. A. W. Lewis Returns from C. E. Convention**

Dr. A. W. Lewis, pastor of the Presbyterian church, has returned after attending the 30th international Christian Endeavor convention, which was held in Portland July 4 to 10. The convention was attended by about 6,000 members of the association from all parts of the United States and Canada, as well as several representatives from foreign countries. Dr. Lewis was one of about 25 from Central Oregon who attended.

The theme of the convention, Dr. Lewis reports, was "Fidelity to Christian Endeavor Principles." Emphasis was placed on the evangelistic, community and missionary activities and the part played in these programs by the Christian Endeavor society.

The program for the next two years which has been outlined will include increased denominational loyalty and more interdenominational cooperation. A definite program to attain standards decided upon at the convention has been given for each month for the next two years. In September, for instance, the goal of the international leaders is to enroll 500,000 young people for Bible reading and scriptural memorizing.

One program definitely decided upon is to recruit thousands of young people into the church. This recruiting will require personal effort by each Christian Endeavorer. According to the leaders, young people can best be won to Christ by young people.

The event of greatest interest at the convention was the retirement from active service of Dr. Francis E. Clark, who 44 years ago established the Christian Endeavor society at Portland, Maine. Dr. Daniel A. Poling, minister of the Carle Collegiate church, New York, who was born in Portland, Oregon, about 40 years ago, was elected president of the united society. Dr. Clark was elected president emeritus. In honor of his long service on an non-salaried basis, the trustees have arranged to establish what is called the Dr. Francis E. Clark Recognition fund of \$100,000, the income of which will be devoted to the support of Dr. and Mrs. Clark so long as both shall live. After they have been called to higher

**Admits Falsification On Homestead Proof**

PORTLAND, July 14.—Mary A. Cox and her son, Ray Morgan, who own a cattle ranch east of Prineville in the Blue mountains, Monday appeared before Federal Judge Bean and pleaded guilty to a charge of making false affidavits in presenting final proof on a homestead under the stock raising homestead law. A plea for leniency, made by Arthur J. Platt, was seconded by Deputy United States District Attorney McGilchrist. The mother was in tears as she rose to plead. The judge paroled her to report for a term of five years.

According to the attorneys, Mrs. Cox was a widow and owned a homestead in the Blue mountains. She took up the additional claim allowed by law, and when she came to prove up on the claim she swore that she had made certain improvements on the property required by law. Her son made affidavit that her statements were correct. Investigation disclosed that the improvements did not exist.

**Bend Girl Is Injured When Auto Capsizes**

Miss Alice Terwilliger of Bend suffered a slight injury to her knee in an automobile accident near Portland Saturday, according to an account in the Monday Oregonian. She was treated at the emergency hospital.

J. A. Eastes and Judge T. E. J. Duffy figured in an accident near McMinnville Saturday evening, according to the Oregonian which says while neither was hurt they were for a time under the car. It was said to have skidded on the slippery road and turned completely over. They drove the car into Portland after a wrecking car arrived and turned their automobile upright again.

Lloyd Magill made the trip over with Judge Duffy, Judge Eastes and Miss Terwilliger but left the party at Springfield so was not in the accident.

"THE SPANIARD" BRIMFUL OF TRULY APPEALING SCENES
