MARKET STRONG, TRADING SHOWS

Little Selling Participated In Today

(Wall Street Journal Financial Review)
NEW YORK, July 14.—Further indication that the market is in a strong technical position was afforded in today's session. Although call money renewed at 4 1/2 per cent, little selling was participated in. Most of the offerings appeared to be of professional origin and were readily absorbed by the strong underlying buying power.

Representative stocks displayed such vitality that uneasiness over the money situation was alleviated. Greater disposition was in evidence in the financial community to look upon the movement of funds to the interior which was responsible for the recent flurry in call money as a healthy signal.

The fact that the call money rate eased off to four per cent resulted in gradually higher priced levels as the day wore on. In stocks like Pab American, U. S. Rubber and D. & H. the advancing tendency was brisk.

Local professionals who bought corn early were free sellers when wheat turned weak.

Oats followed corn. Provisions were lower.

BOSTON, July 14.—The wool market is firm but with aggregate business smaller. Prices were firm with an advancing tendency, however, owing to the stronger markets abroad. Local dealers were big buyers in Australian markets yesterday and prices, although generally under a parity with London prices, were based on super merinos which dealers of America bid for. The impression prevailed that if Australian merinos can be bought at \$1.40 duty paid and top making wools at \$1.30, it makes domestic territory grades at \$1.30 to \$1.35 look rather high.

The Dalles "No Jury" Ordinance Questioned

THE DALLES, Ore., July 14.—Admitting that there is a problem of constitutionality involved, Circuit Judge Fred W. Wilson today denied the petition of Tom Vernon for a writ of habeas corpus, following his conviction in the city recorder's court on a charge of selling liquor, after he had been tried without a jury.

Vernon demanded a jury trial and was refused that right under the provisions of a city ordinance which in 1921 abolished the jury system in the municipal police magistrate's court and declared that there should be no appeal from it. Although the defendant is technically in jail serving out a fine of \$85 assessed by Police Judge D. L. Gates, he is at liberty under bond to the city attorney.

The case will be appealed to the supreme court, the tribunal which, in the opinion of Judge Wilson, should determine the question.

Natron Cutoff Camps Are In Need of Men

Men to work on the Natron cutoff construction are in great demand, according to men in touch with the employment situation there and in Bend. Demand for haying hands elsewhere is held responsible for the shortage of construction workers.

Hay hands are getting from \$3 to \$4 a day and many who have been working for a long time on the construction work are anxious for a change.

Work on the line between Paulina and Odell lake is expected to be completed by August 1. This is the section under contract by the Utah Construction Co.

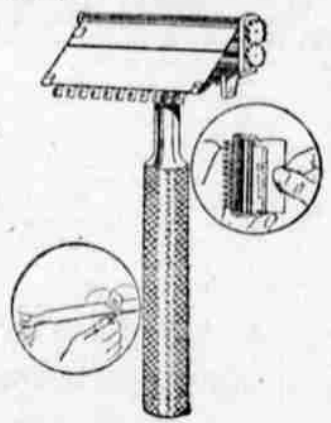
