

Genaro Recognized As New Champion Of Flyweights

HAS EARNED IT SAYS MULDOON

Jimmy McLarnin Growing Too Fast

(U. P. Leased Wire to The Bend Bulletin) NEW YORK, July 15.—Little Frankie Genaro, from that section of the east side known as "Little Italy," will be recognized as the new world flyweight champion at the next meeting of the New York boxing commission.

William Muldoon, senior member and former chairman of the commission, said today he had no doubt that the little fellow who won the Olympic flyweight championship for the United States at Antwerp in 1920 was entitled to succeed Pancho Villa whose career was ended by sudden death yesterday in San Francisco.

There is no question that Genaro is entitled to appointment or recognition as the new champion. He has to his credit one victory over the former champion, among others in the class.

There are not enough good little fellows among the flyweights to take part in an elimination tournament. It is a weak class where few can make the weight for long.

Jimmy McLarnin, on the coast, must be a good little fellow, as he beat Villa last week, but he is said to be filling out so rapidly that he may be in the featherweight class by the time he reaches his majority. So, the best thing the commission could do would be to announce Genaro as the possessor of the title and tell him to go out and defend it—and he would.

Villa was one of the most colorful of all the boxers. He had a passion for music and for clothes. He was known for his ability to strain, a few before he gained any great reputation as a fighter, and as a dresser he was the swankiest little fellow in two shoes.

His disregard for money almost drove Frank Churchill, his manager, into despair. Villa would buy a dozen suits and two dozen silk shirts at a time and later pass them out among his friends.

During his career Villa must have earned at least \$200,000 for himself, but it is understood that his estate will not be worth more than \$10,000.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 15.—Tentative plans for public funeral services honoring Pancho Villa, flyweight champion boxer who died here yesterday during an operation, today awaited approval of his manager, Frank Churchill.

Rites for the little Filipino battler were planned at Eagles' hall, where his fellow countrymen and admirers could pay their last respects.

Villa's body will be sent to the Philippines by the first steamer, for disposition by his family.

An autopsy revealed that death was due to an acute edema of the glottis, following an abscess of the maxillary gland.

PORTLAND, July 15.—About the only way to satisfactorily pick a new world's flyweight champion, now that Pancho Villa is dead, will be to hold an elimination tournament. James A. Farley, chairman of the New York boxing commission, declared here today.

"I have not yet been in communication with the New York office since I heard of Villa's death," Farley, here for the national Elks' convention, said. "However, I am confident that the commission would never agree to let the title go to Frankie Genaro, the American champion, unless the latter demonstrated his ability to meet all comers."

Racing Cars On Trip Taking Rest In Bend

Four racing cars driven by the men who will pilot them in the British Columbia race meeting at Vancouver, B. C., August 14, 15 and 16, were in Bend today and may be here for several days. There was a possibility, the drivers said, that they would stage a race somewhere in Central Oregon next Sunday.

The cars included a Duesenberg straight eight in which Eddie Rickenbacker won the Indianapolis sweepstakes in 1921, according to its present driver, Art Haskins, and a Dodge special, driven by Carl Alden, which set the track record for one mile, 1:03 4-5 seconds, at Vancouver last year.

The group of cars also includes a DeSoto special, driven by George Lott, and a Fronte special driven by Clyde Beal. J. C. Beck, a driver who was injured in a crash during the Susanville meeting recently, is also a member of the party, all of whom were entered in the Susanville races.

Tony Fuente Found Guilty of Faking Match

Fuente was found guilty of "faking" a match here last Friday night with Nick Newman, Los Angeles, Newman, Fuente and their respective managers, Al Lopez and John "Pop" Nealls, were each fined \$150 and sentenced to 15 days in jail.

Attorneys for the men filed appeals and \$250 bail for each of the defendants pending a rehearing. Newman, who fought under the nickname of "Sailor McCarthy," was not present at the trial. He disappeared after the trick bout when an angry mob of fans threatened to harm him and has not been located.
