 GRASS VALLEY, Cal., July 15.—Friends and comrades of Archie Cunningham, 20 year old mine employee, today answered their invitations to his birthday party with condolences and funeral wreaths.

Cunningham was killed Monday in a cave-in at the mine. It was his 20th birthday and invitations to a surprise party in his honor had been given out this week. The funeral services for the lad were to be held at his home here today. A birthday cake, baked by his mother on the day of the tragedy, rests untouched beside his casket. The 20 candles were never lighted.

California Storm Kills, Others Hurt, Damage Big

 HUNTINGTON LAKE, Fresno County, Cal., July 15.—A terrific electrical storm struck here at 1 o'clock this morning, lasting four hours, taking one life and causing much damage.

Dave Barclay, Fowler, Cal., was instantly killed. Frank Askinval and George Luckenball were injured. Two hundred occupants of summer cottages and tents fled before the fierce wind and rain. Tents were blown down and cottages wrecked by falling trees.

U. S. Steel Director's Body Found Near Horse, Report

SOMERVILLE, N. J., July 15.—Richard V. Lindabury, general counsel and a director of the United States Steel Corporation and Prudential Insurance Company, was found dead in the woods near his Bernardsville estate today, according to word received here by William H. Long, Somerset county physician. The body was found near Lindabury's horse, on

which he had gone riding early this morning. Death is reported to have been due to natural causes.

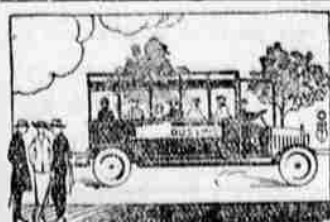

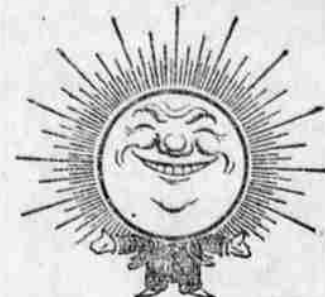
