SHARES TURNED AT HIGH LEVEL

American Can Takes the Lead In Trading

(Wall Street Journal Financial Review)
NEW YORK, July 15.—Industrial shares turned upward to the highest levels in history today to the accompaniment of easier money and further indications of a gratifying outlook for autumn business.

American Can afforded leadership when it sold above 200, its previous high. Aggressiveness on the side of rising prices also was in evidence in Steel, Dupont, Mack Truck, General Electric, United States Rubber and other leading industrials.

After call loans had renewed at 4 per cent, the rate dropped to 3 1/2 per cent, at which figure funds were obtainable the balance of the day. This was followed by enthusiastic bullish impulses from the constructive character of the weekly reviews of the steel trade. These descriptions, taken in conjunction with the recent expansion in car loadings to the heavy aggregate the nation's railroads have ever handed at this season of the year, played an important part in the buoyancy which the general market displayed throughout the session. SEE QUICK DEMAND FOR LABOR SUPPLY

Early Wheat Harvest Makes Shortage Felt In Mills

SPOKANE, July 15.—A sudden spurt in the demand for men featured last week's employment reports from various inland Empire centers, according to reports received at Four L district headquarters here today.

With lumber manufacturing at normal capacity, with the wheat harvest a week earlier than usual and with construction and general farm work at seasonal height, an actual shortage of common labor has been felt in some localities, according to George W. Young of the Four L employment service office here.

There are enough men to handle the vast amount of work to be done, but the difficulty is proper and quick distribution as men are needed, Young said. Railroads are experiencing some difficulty in getting all of the men they need, according to Young, who stated that a large number of men are now going to the farming districts daily. Reports from the various districts follow:

Sandpoint—Plenty of sawmill men and loggers.

Coeur d'Alene—No shortage nor surplus of sawmill help.

St. Maries—Labor supply fair.

Potlatch—Labor supply about equal to demand.

Elk River Country—Woods operations running; some shortage of help.

Lewiston—Harvest started; a few additional men needed.

Walla Walla—Men traveling to this point; harvest started.

Yakima/Tupenish—Labor supply fair.

Wenatchee—Labor supply good.

Colville—Local help filling all calls for men.

Palouse—Demand for harvest help increasing; wheat cutting just getting started.

Waverly—Harvest getting under way; some men needed. Crops good.

Big Bend Country—Labor supply food; will need but few additional harvest hands.

Pendleton—Harvest started; men being shipped here from Portland and Spokane.

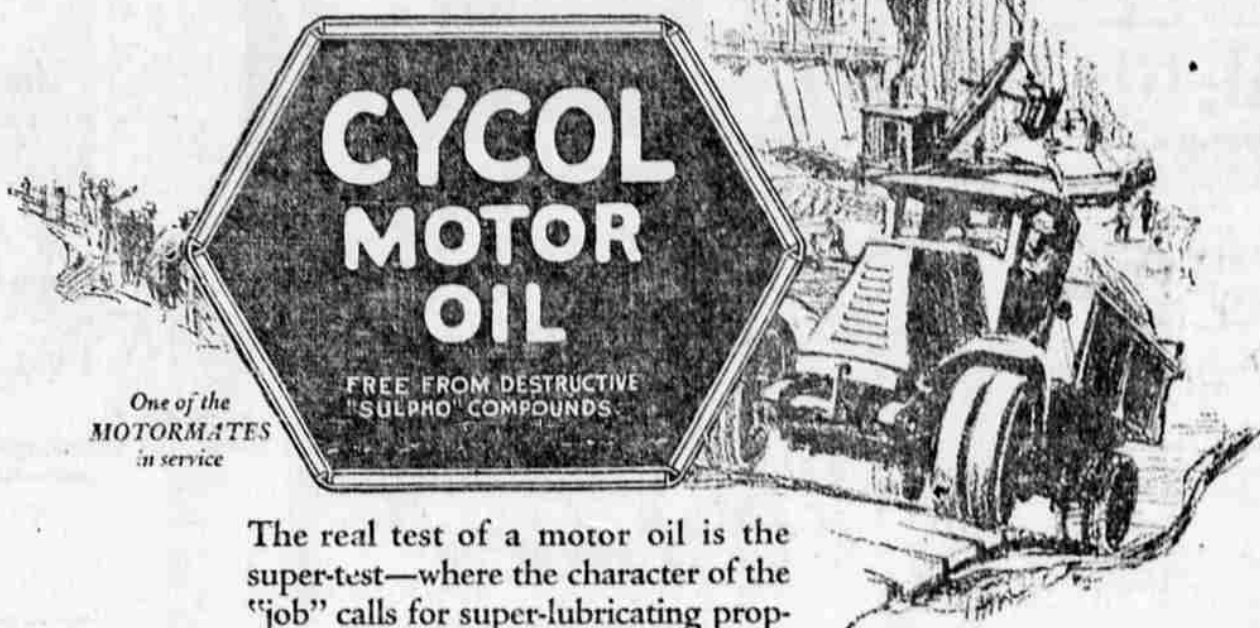
