

Dempsey, Back From Europe, Says He'll Fight This Year

GIANT BLACK IS RULED OUT

Champ Wants Practice Before Wills Battle

 NEW YORK, July 16.—Jack Dempsey, the world's heavyweight champion, is going to fight this year, but not against Harry Wills.
 "Not until next summer for Wills," Dempsey said late yesterday, when he returned from a trip to Europe with his wife, Ethel Taylor.
 "Wills is a big fellow and a good fighter," Dempsey said. "I've got to get a couple of fights under my belt before I meet him. I haven't been in a ring since I fought Fiero and I know that I have to get some target practice."

Dempsey didn't look well when he returned. He said he was weighing about 200 pounds, but he didn't look it. There were folds in his coat across the shoulder and plenty of foam inside his collar. He said he was suffering from a heavy cold and that he wasn't a good sailor.

The passengers on the ship saw very little of him, they said. James O. Anderson, captain of the Australian Davis cup team, said:
 "I think the chap was a bit under, you know."

Dempsey had denial for all the stories that have been going around about his affairs.

"Jack Kearns and I are bound by contract for another year," he said. "He can still do business for me, but he has to ask me about it."

Dempsey said that he was not in financial distress.

"I made money in Europe and I didn't spend much," he said.

The champion said he was not concerned about the attitude of the New York boxing commission. It is likely that Dempsey will fight either Gene Tunney or Bartley Madden in the fall. Floyd Fitzsimmons wants Dempsey to fight for him at Michigan City, and Jimmy De Forest would like to put him on in his pole position. If the boxing commission will allow Dempsey to engage in a preliminary fight as it did in the case of Mike Walker, the fight will be staged in New York with Tunney as the opponent.

Professional Drivers To Race at Redmond

Automobile racing as it is done at the big meetings throughout the country will be seen for the first time in Deschutes county next Sunday on the Redmond fair grounds track. It was announced today by Manager G. W. Lott of the group of racing cars which are now at the Redmond camp ground.

Lott declares that the track at Redmond is the best five-eighths mile track for auto racing in Oregon. It is now being put in shape for auto racing and in the meantime, Lott is attempting to get in touch with other drivers who cross their way north to the Vancouver, B. C. races, with a view to having them enter in the meeting at Redmond Sunday.

The races will start at 2:30 o'clock Sunday afternoon.
 The admission charge will include the privilege of parking automobiles inside the racing field, but spectators will not be allowed on the outside of the track on account of the danger.

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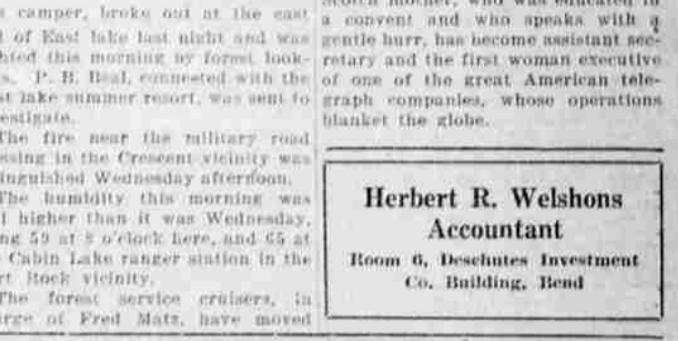
