

France Declared By Expert Coming Nation In Tennis

IMPROVEMENT SEEN IN GAME

Lacoste Keeps Index of Weaknesses in Play

 NEW YORK, July 17.—"France is the coming nation on the court and probably will be a Davis cup winner in a few years," James O. Anderson, captain of the Australian Davis cup team, said here today.

Anderson has just arrived from London, where he played in the British national championship tournament at Wimbledon and saw the French team sweep most every event in the field.

Rene Lacoste and Gene Borotra, it will be recalled, were the finalists and Lacoste won the title. They won the men's doubles and Borotra and Mlle. Suzanne Lenglen won the mixed doubles after she had won the women's singles championship.

"Lacoste has improved his game most amazingly," Anderson said. "They tell me the fellow keeps an index in which he has notations about the weakness and strong points in the other fellows' game. He certainly takes his tennis seriously and he had a good name."

"Mlle. Lenglen has always been so perfect that it is difficult to imagine any improvement that she might accept in her game but she looked more perfect than ever at Wimbledon. She was not tested for one single minute and there were some very good players in the tournament."

Anderson would not express an opinion about a match between Mlle. Lenglen and Miss Helen Wills, the American champion, but he admitted that he "should like very much to see it."

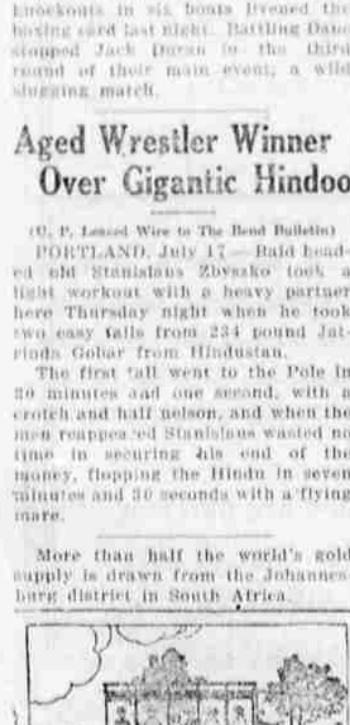

Poor old Ty Cobb, here he is 40 years of age and he is still just as enthusiastic to set records as he was ten years ago.

Ty is taking advantage of the ivory ball and is leaning against it for the first time in his career. He is after a record for a few long distance wallpats as is usually seen by his feat of banging out three four base slams in one game and connecting for two more the next, setting a record for five homers in two days.

This season, his twenty-first, Cobb shattered rather a few records. He is away over Wagner's extra base record of 908 and also the big Dutchman's record for total bases (37).

Cobb has set the record for singles made in a lifetime, and total bases in a major league career. Besides these he has set marks for total number of hits, the total number of runs scored and the number of runs scored in a single game.

Kearns Still Manager, Now Dempsey Will Fight

Intimates He Won't Let Champion Attend to Own Match-making, But Doesn't Says How He'll Prevent It

LOS ANGELES, July 17.—Jack Kearns, manager of Jack Dempsey, proclaimed to the world today that he was still in charge of the world's heavyweight title corporation and would sign the dotted lines for any matches the champion might arrange with Tex Rickard in New York.

Kearns made it plain he was not satisfied with Dempsey's independence in arranging title bouts with the eastern promoter.

"If the big fellow thinks he can sign a couple of contracts for himself without consulting me, he's all wet," asserted the indignant manager. "I've got a contract with Dempsey that's good as gold and I'll dictate the terms on any fight he may arrange, and I'll take my cut."

"I'm glad to see that Dempsey is sinking his own losses from this just for globe trotting and is showing a disposition to put his mitts on again."

"But I know his fighting value and I know how to arrange championship matches. I handled him long before he was a champion and I have kept him on the up for some time."

"I don't intend to let him fight a couple of bumps or get howled over by a good fighter before he gets himself in shape for a real battle."

Kearns said he favored a bout for the champion with Harry Wills next year and also a couple of preliminary matches with other title aspirants.

"I went east and fought for Dempsey," Kearns continued. "I got myself set down in New York for fighting his battle. I sent him four

telegrams and he has not done me the courtesy to reply to any of them. He just rushes to the newspaper men and tells them what a swell match-maker he is. I've had fighters before I ever knew Dempsey and I'll have them after we have parted, so I know now just what to do."
