**COOK TO MANAGER**  
**E. A. SMITH RECORD**

**New Deschutes Power Head Real Biscuit Builder**

From cooking for a telephone line crew which established communication between the widely separated towns of Central Oregon in 1905, to general superintendent of a power company which serves the greater part of that territory, is the record of E. A. Smith, recently appointed by the Spokane officials of the Deschutes Power Co. to the position formerly held by C. L. Shattuck at Prineville.

Men who took part in the task, a monumental one at that time, of connecting Bend, Prineville, Shaniko, Burns, La Pine and intermediate points by telephone in 1905, recall

that Smith was one of the most expert camp cooks they ever had the good fortune to encounter, and they still mention with superlative adjectives the biscuits and hotcakes that found their way from his sheet iron stove to their plates.

When not busy in the big covered wagon that served as a kitchen and dining room, Smith, because he was light and active, strung the wire on the poles, and thus began his career as an electrician.

Smith remained with the telephone company for six years, then entered the employ of the Bend Water, Light & Power Co., about the time that T. H. Foley became manager. He remained with this company until a little over a year ago.

Coming to Central Oregon in 1901 from Canada, Smith had taken up a homestead on Tumalo creek in what is now Sheslay park. He was married 14 years ago to Miss Flossie V. Reed, a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James E. Reed.

Smith's new position is one which Shattuck held since 1913, when the Deschutes Power Co. system was installed, until a few weeks ago when he died suddenly at Prineville. The company serves Madras, Metolius, Culver, Terrebonne and Redmond with electricity, and Prineville with both electricity and water.

**GOOD WEEK END IN INDUSTRIALS**

**American Can Leader In Upward Trend**

(Wall Street Journal Financial Review)

NEW YORK, July 18.—Industrial shares received further stimulus in the week end session from reports gathered in the leading business centers by the mercantile reviewers to the effect that retail dealers were breaking away from a cautious buying policy and were laying in stocks of goods on a scale indicating increasing confidence regarding autumn trade.

American Can inspired good buying of other standard industrials by a further remarkable uprush which brought the stock well above its previous record levels. Steel common also reached new high ground on the movement and sharp advances occurred in American Air Brake, American Chemical preferred and various other specialties.

**France, Spain to Offer Peace Terms to Moors**

PARIS, July 18.—The Quai d'Orsay today confirmed that France and Spain are about to send semi official delegates to Abd El Krim, Ruffian chieftain, to impart to him the two nations' peace terms.

These terms will be virtually in the form of an ultimatum, as Krim will be told he must give a "yes" or "no" reply.

The commission, semi official in the sense that its members will be subordinates, will probably consist of two French representatives and two Spanish.

The delegation will probably meet Krim at Ajdir on the day of Alhucemas, Morocco. France is expected to decline any suggestion from Krim for an armistice, on the theory that such would simply give him an opportunity to incite tribes against the French.

It is scarcely anticipated that Krim will accept the peace proffers, for it is admitted that the proposal of a conditional autonomy for him would probably be difficult of acceptance when he now has virtual independence.

**Story Says City Broke, Then Editor Arrested**

COVINGTON, Ky., July 18.—Down here in old Kentucky where they used to settle slanders with sixshoot-

ern, a newspaper editor is under arrest for violating the new "gossip law."

Bruce I. Suzong, editor of the Kentucky Post, published an article about Covington city officials, commenting upon steps that have been taken to borrow \$50,000.

He was arrested and had to give bond for his appearance at a hearing next Wednesday.

The paragraph on which the warrant for the editor's arrest was based read:

"Those who have held position in the city financial department say that insofar as they can remember, this is the first time in history that the city

was broke within a month after the June taxes were collected."
