

SCOPES TRIAL NEARLY ENDED

Few Hours of Oratory
Left Before Verdict

Contempt Proceedings Held
Likely Against Attor-
ney for Defense

DAYTON, Tenn., July 18.—Day-
ton's day in the sun is waning.
The Scopes trial, to all intents and
purposes, is practically over.

A few hours of flaming oratory on
William J. Bryan sums up in tri-
umph and Clarence Darrow fight-
back in defeat, and then the young
defendant will be found guilty and
the case that put this little Tennes-
see town into the spotlight will be
on its way to the higher courts.

Attorneys for both sides agreed to-
day that Judge Raulston's ban on in-
troduction of scientific evidence
means that by next Tuesday night
the case will be closed and trains to
the north, east, south and west, laden
with departing experts, counsel, cor-
respondents and visitors.

There was a scant possibility that
Judge Raulston, after perusing
12,000 words of scientific evidence
in behalf of evolution, presented by
the defense in the form of affidavits,
would reserve himself and permit the
jury to hear the experts brought here
by Clarence Darrow and his associ-
ates. But the chance was slight.

What seemed equally possible was
that Judge Raulston would take ac-
tion against Darrow, who clearly laid
himself open to contempt proceedings
yesterday when he commented upon
the court's rulings.

After Raulston reads the affida-
vits, if he still believes the jury
should not hear their contents, clos-
ing arguments will be made and the
jury will be given the fate of Thomas
Scopes, who taught the school chil-
dren of Dayton the theory of evolu-
tion. Scopes already is facing for the
\$500 fine he undoubtedly will be
assessed when found guilty.

guarantee for replacement of defect-
ive parts and free service on adjust-
ments.

3. Every used car is conspicuously
marked with its price in plain fig-
ures, and that price, just as the price
of new cars, is rigidly maintained.

4. Every purchaser of a used car
may drive it for five days, and then,
if not satisfied for any reason, turn
it back and apply the money paid as
a credit on the purchase of any other
car in stock—new or used.

To sell unused transportation rather
than used cars is the keynote of the
Studebaker pledge plan. It is
generally recognized that many cars
are traded in on new cars before
their full worth has been exhausted.
This is especially true with Stude-

means that 75 or 80 miles an hour
must be made on the straightaways.
The racing cars will be displayed
on the streets of Bend this evening—
some of them were driven about the
streets earlier today.

by Art Haskins, a Dodge special
driven by Carl Alden, a Frontenac
special driven by Clyde Deal and a
Pelican special driven by George
Lott.
