KOREAN FLOODS DO BIG DAMAGE

Casualties Reach 2,000, Say Dispatches

Relief Work Begun Today Near Seoul—200 Bodies Reported Recovered

TOKIO, July 29.—Casualties—dead, injured and ill—in the floods in Korea were estimated today at 2,000.

The military radio from Seoul brought tidings that the casualties were "beyond estimate."

Foreign dispatches said floods were extending to South Korea and that rain continued to pour.

The Hankang river, whose dikes burst Saturday, was reported 59 feet above normal.

The Ktoho railway station on the border of the flood zone wired that the "situation is terrible" and pictured people stranded helplessly on the roofs of their houses.

Relief workers have begun to assist. Railways between Fusan and Mukden have been forced to suspend service.

OSAKA, Japan, July 29.—Two hundred bodies have been recovered from the flood waters which inundated Seoul, capital of Korea, and many others were reported drowned in last week's flood. The damage is estimated at \$40,000,000. Twenty thousand houses have been damaged. Relief measures are proceeding authoritatively.

MOVIES OF BENEFIT IN GIVING PUBLICITY

News Reel Shots Bring Inquiries Regarding Mine

That the moving pictures taken in Central Oregon several weeks ago by the Fox news service are resulting in much favorable publicity for the Deschutes country is shown by letters being received by the Bend Commercial club.

While in this part of the state, the news reel operator took pictures of the diatomite mines at Lower Bridge. These pictures are evidently attracting the most attention. Only recently a letter was received making inquiries about the "face powder mine." Diatomite is used as a base for talcum powders.

Another inquiry about the Lower Bridge diatomite deposits was received from the office of a wholesale druggist concern in San Francisco. The writer of this letter wanted to know the location of the mine, conveying the impression that the news reel was presented under a Bend caption, since the inquiry was addressed to Bend.

The pictures of the Central Oregon country have been released in several parts of the northwest, but have not yet been shown in Portland. Pictures were also taken of the lava caves southwest of Bend.

Lava Duck Is New Bird Sent State University

"I find that our biology professors on the campus are woefully ignorant concerning this species of bird, but before I get through with my program of education, they will know all about it."

This is the statement contained in a letter received today by L. K. Cramb, secretary of the Bend Commercial club, from Dr. E. C. Robbins, dean of the University of Oregon school of commerce. The "bird" in question is a "lava duck."

The "lava duck," Cramb explains, is a Central Oregon product, and is made, instead of raised. The "ducks" are made from pine cones by W. A. Richardson of Bend. One of the manufactured "birds" was given to Dean Robbins by Cramb for classification.

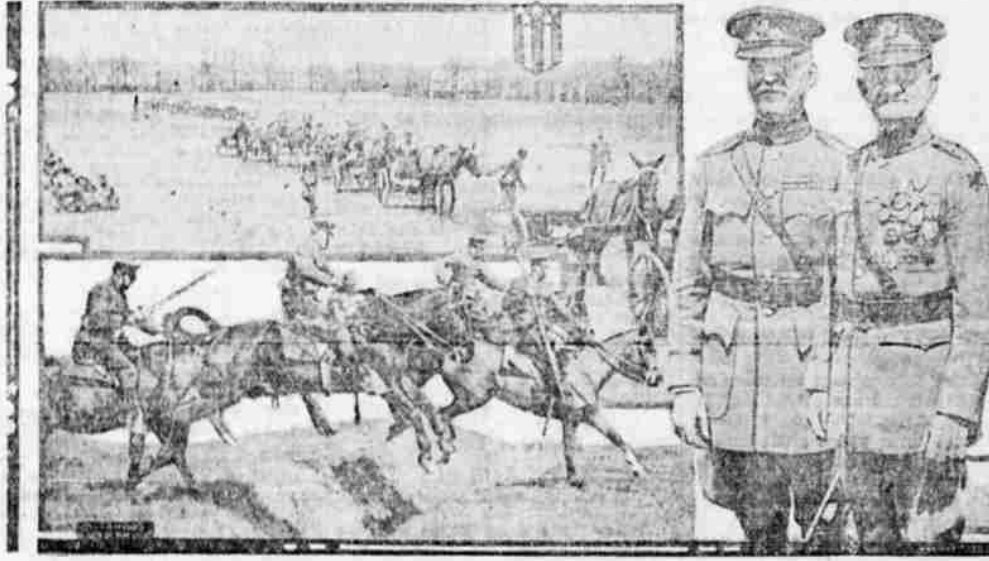

Soldiers to Stage Fine Show for the Middle West



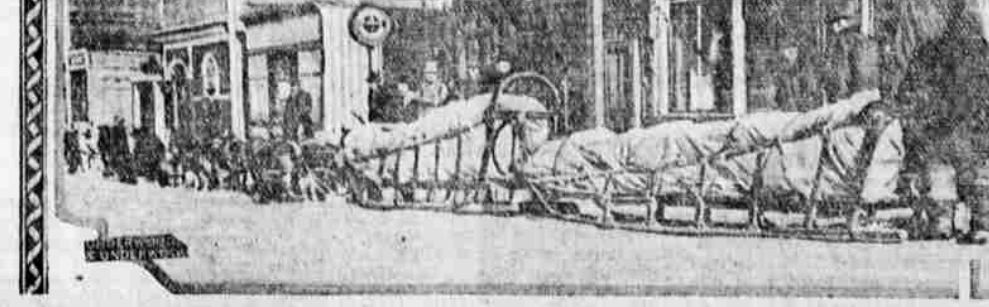
