MARKET SHOWS NEW BOUYANCY

Railroad Stocks Advance As Hearing Resumed

NEW YORK, July 20.—After enduring in a series of corrective movements in the first three hours, stocks developed renewed strength in the afternoon trading.

The general market regained its buoyancy which characterized the greater part of last week's dealings and further gains were scored in many sections of the list.

Resumption of the Nickel Plate hearing furnished the signal for a demonstration in the railroad group. Industrial shares were stimulated by business reports indicating an optimistic ratio between production and consumption.

Puzzling Giant Teeth Are Brought to Bend

May be Only Those of Range Horse, Suggested

Find Made Near Masten Mill Can't Be Positively Identified By Amateur Paleontologists

Giant teeth, possibly those of some creature which is now extinct, but more likely those of a large horse that died on the Central Oregon range many years ago, were brought to Bend Sunday by John H. Buehholz and son, Edward.

The teeth, one being five inches long and more than one and one-half inches wide, were found in a shattered and weather bleached skull on Little River, not far from the Masten mill, by Buehholz and his son. The teeth, 12 in number, were removed from the skull, and for this reason local amateur paleontologists find them difficult to identify.

One of the teeth, which attracted considerable attention today, has a peculiarly formed root. This tooth, it is explained by dentists who were shown the huge molar, had evidently been elongated. The teeth are those of a herbivorous animal.

Although quite willing to examine the remains of the dead animals, Edward, 11 years of age, showed no inclination to investigate another creature which made its appearance near the boy's fishing ground Sunday. This animal was a black bear.

LONDON, July 20.—Loren Murchison, American sprint star, asked today for an immediate investigation of the charge that he had been guilty of an act of professionalism in Germany.

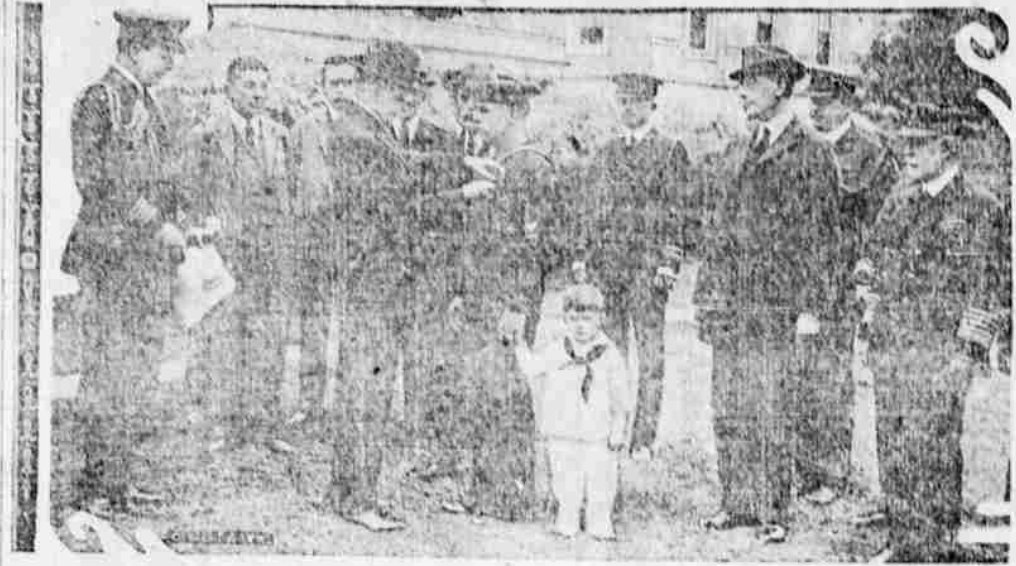
German officials charged that he had demanded an exorbitant fee to compete in several races.

Murchison said he entered the Brooklyn national championships in which he won the two sprinting events, with the understanding that any medals he might win would be withheld until an investigation had been made.

WASHINGTON, July 20.—Recount of the ballots in the election of Senator Smith W. Brookhart, Iowa, independent republican, over his democratic opponent, Daniel C. Steek, was ordered by a subcommittee of the senate privileges and elections committee when investigation of the election was begun today.

A special staff of the elections committee immediately began work of counting several million ballots which were cast.

More Defense Needed On Coast, Says Hale

SWAMPSCOTT, Mass., July 20.—The United States needs enlarged facilities for defense of the nation from the Pacific coast side, President Coolidge was told today.

Senator Frederick Hale of Maine, chairman of the senate naval affairs committee, made an unexpected call at the summer White House today to explain the results of a recent survey of Pacific coast naval facilities.

A first class naval base along the Pacific at Alameda, Calif., or some other locality, is necessary, Senator Hale said.

The channel of the entrance to Pearl Harbor, Hawaii, should be deepened, he said. Pearl Harbor is regarded as the key of the United States Pacific naval operations.

August Is Planting Time For Bulbs, Growers Told

For best results, floral bulbs, such as hyacinths, tulips, daffodils and jonquills, should be planted before the last of August, according to Mrs. Florence Montgomery, manager of the Metolius River Bulb farm, who was in Bend this morning.

Mrs. Montgomery brought with her to Bend a large bouquet of many colored flowers, which are on display in the office of The Bulletin this afternoon.

Toning up stomach muscles adds weight

PATRONS who have attended my symposium because of underweight have, in the great majority of cases, been suffering from mal-assimilation. They all seem to have good appetites and consume more food than their fat brothers and sisters. However, they are only putting an increased burden on their digestive systems, which have very little power of assimilation. In so doing they are apt to do themselves much more harm than good. In most cases the digestive system is not functioning properly because the muscles which tone up the circulation thereby increasing assimilation.

Some part of each day should be set aside for rest and relaxation. At least eight hours sleep every night in a well ventilated room is essential, using as little bed covering as possible.

consistently of regulating, fattening and repairing foods, including all kinds of creamed soups, vegetables, cereals, bread, bananas, etc.

With this diet, of course, daily exercise is essential. This should be taken either in long outdoor walks or by exercising in the bedroom before breakfast every morning upon arising. From twelve to twenty minutes should be spent in going through movements of a passive nature. Care must be taken to avoid strain and fatigue. Just enough stimulation should be received to tone up the circulation thereby increasing assimilation.

Diet for Gaining Weight

Upon arising ten minutes exercise, after which take a warm bath followed by a cold spray or shower. Rub the body lightly with a Turkish towel until a good reaction is obtained after which drink two glasses of water.

BREAKFAST: Any kind of cereal fruit, some warm cereal; place two tablespoons of butter in the cereal, mix with milk and cream, with a little sugar. Cocoa, chocolate or coffee substitute. Toast heavily buttered. An hour after breakfast take a glass of orange juice, and an hour after lunch take a glass of water.

LUNCH: A cream or thickened soup. Vegetables, dark bread and a glass of milk. Between lunch and dinner take two glasses of water and one glass of milk.

DINNER: Meat, chicken or fish. One green vegetable. A baked potato with plenty of butter. Fruit or pudding. Between dinner and bedtime two glasses of water.
