

# Dempsey's Discourtesies Unheeded by Commission

## FAILS TO SIGN TO RISK CROWN

### Appointment Broken, He Heads for Home

NEW YORK, July 21.—The New York state boxing commission once more let Jack Dempsey "get away with it."

Instead of waiting Olympian wrath upon the head of the heavyweight champion when he failed to appear before them today, Chairman Farley and his colleagues gave the threshold a fortnight's grace.

The commission had directed Dempsey to appear today and sign on the dotted line for a bout with Harry Wills, negro challenger. Instead, Dempsey is speeding westward to settle some other matters with his manager, "Doc" Kearns, on the Pacific coast. The champion broke his engagement here with never even a "sorry, old dears."

The commission decided to stage another "elimination contest" to select a successor to Pancho Villa's flyweight title which the little brown man held at the time of his death last week. Instead of naming Frankie Genaro, American champion and much the best man in the class.

NEW YORK, July 21.—Lacking the authority to impose a death sentence, the New York boxing commission may decide upon a life sentence for Jack Dempsey, when he fails to appear at its meeting today.

At the last meeting of the commission, the heavyweight champion appeared before Commissioner Muldown and told him that he accepted the challenge of Harry Wills and asked for the privilege of engaging in one or more warmup bouts.

He was told to come back today when he would be given the verdict.

Dempsey will not be back today, because he is speeding to the coast on an errand, his friends say, to break up his realty partnership with Jack Kearns. Tex. Richard was telecast by Dempsey to represent him before the commission.

The commission may not jump at the opening to grant Dempsey's request because of another sign at its dignity that the champion took by running off to California.

Mickey Walker, Dempsey's little stable mate, may also get a sentence in the same stable with the heavy weight champion unless he can tell the commission today something definite about a bout with Dave Shade. Walker has been given plenty of time to think it over and it is understood that he has thought it over so much he has decided he wants nothing of Shade and is also going to California.

## Auto Stage Rates High, Hearing Is Under Way
