QUOTES WILSON ON EVOLUTION

Was Surprised at Raising of Question

Truth Cruel But Can Not be Ignored, Declared by Grandson of Huxley

OXFORD, England, July 21.—I have just seen an interesting letter written in 1922 by the late President Wilson in answer to a question concerning evolution. It is quoted in "Science" for 1925, page 597, and should interest William Jennings Bryan as the president's former secretary of state.

Wilson wrote:
"Of course, like every other man of intelligence and education, I do believe in organic evolution. It surprises me that at this late date such questions should be raised."
Bryan, in his latest pronouncement, states that Darwin's theory of natural selection is cruel, therefore we ought not to believe it.

This is a particularly good example of the mental practice indulged in by all children and most primitive theologians of believing things because they are what we like instead of because they are true.

War is cruel, but it would not have helped France if she had refused to believe in its existence. In August, 1914.

It is surely time that humanity learns to face facts.

Truth is one of humanity's ultimate values.

It is for freedom to search for and discuss and proclaim truth that science fights the tyranny of fundamentalism.

What strikes an Englishman is the extraordinary nature of evidence admitted in the trial, contrasted with that not admitted.

Apparently Bryan thinks he has scored a point when he elicits the fact that species classified man as a mammal. Since he possesses the same organs and plan of structure as other mammals, it is difficult to see how else to classify him. On the other hand, the refusal to admit scientific testimony shows that the case is prejudiced and Darwin's comments on the judge's rulings do not seem strange to the outsider.

This was the information obtained from Governor Walter M. Pierce by D. G. McLeland, manager of the Tumalo district, Sunday when the governor was in this part of the state to deliver an address at the Norse-American centennial picnic.

The desert land board and the securities commission will come to Central Oregon to make a personal inspection of the Tumalo project to determine whether the state should extend the guarantee on the Tumalo lands for a period of two and one-half years.

In announcing that the desert land board and the securities commission would be here by the middle of August, Governor Pierce said that the board and commission members will not visit the project this month because certain members find it impossible to come to Central Oregon at this time.

Stills of Moonshiners Are Found Dismantled

Are all of the moonshiners in Deschutes county going out of business?

Four times since the new law making moonshining a felony went into effect, the sheriff's raiding parties have stalked places where they had reason to believe a still was in operation, only to find it dismantled or abandoned.

Early this morning Deputies George Stokoe and L. A. W. Nixon crawled through the brush for half a mile above the bridge across the Deschutes on the Tumalo road.

They found the place where someone had been making moonshine, but nothing was left but several barrels of spoiled mash, each barrel infested by a colony of wood rats, and some other parts of the still which had been demolished.

Indications that the plant had not been used for at least a month were seen.
