**STOCK PRICE GAIN HALTED**

**Slight Flurry Is Noted In Call Money**

(Wall Street Journal Financial Review)  
NEW YORK, July 21.—After continuing without interruption for more than a week, advancing tendencies in industrial shares were finally checked today due to heavy profit taking. On the run up in call money to 4 1/2 per cent, in place of the 3 3/4 per cent rate, prevailing since Friday, the market weakened.

Heavy withdrawals by out of town banks finds the local market extremely sensitive, accounting for the slight flurry which occurred in call money.

But the fact that the higher rate was a perfectly natural development, did not deter professionals from employing it as an excuse for launching a heavy drive against the general list.

However, both short selling and liquidation by traders accepting profits were readily absorbed and in certain sections of the list advances came.

**VICTORY SEEN OVER DISEASE**

**Discovery of Cancer Virus Important**

**Dr. J. C. Vandevent Visits Laboratory of Dr. Gye While Touring Europe**

That the age long battle of humanity against cancer, one of the most fearful of all diseases, is now nearing its end with the medical profession the victor as the result of the discovery of a cancer causing virus by Dr. W. E. Gye of London, is the opinion held by many of the leading medical authorities of the world.

Such is the gist of an interview obtained this afternoon from Dr. J. C. Vandevent, who returned to his home in Bend last night from a two months' tour of England, Ireland, Scotland and the continent of Europe, visiting when in London the laboratory of Dr. Gye, "a quiet, retiring man who is giving his time, without profit, for the good of humanity."

Dr. Vandevent, accompanied by a few other surgeons and physicians, visited the laboratory of Dr. Gye just a short time before the news was broadcast over the world that a cancer causing virus had been discovered. It is the opinion of Dr. Vandevent that the news of the great discovery "broke" without the sanction of Dr. Gye, who would prefer to complete his experiments before making known his discovery.

Experiments in immunization through the development of an anti toxin which will destroy the cancer tissue without destroying other tissues of the body are now being carried on in the Gye laboratory, described by Dr. Vandevent as a rather simple medical workshop, and it is the hope and belief of medical men that this immunization work will meet with success. Such success will mean that the scourge of cancer will be greatly lessened through inoculation.

The visit of Dr. Vandevent to the Gye laboratory was one of the outstanding events in the Bend surgeon's trip to Europe with 500 other American medical men. Dr. Vandevent was away from Bend since the early part of May. London and Leeds, England; Belfast and Dublin, Ireland; Glasgow and Edinburgh, Scotland; Paris, France; Heidelberg and Frankfurt, Germany; the Swiss Alps; Antwerp and Brussels, Belgium were among the places in Europe visited by Dr. Vandevent.

**Sanitation Fond Poor**  
Health and sanitation conditions in England and on the continent are in no way comparable to similar conditions in this country, according to Dr. Vandevent, who mentioned that intestinal tuberculosis is giving much trouble abroad. This, it is believed by physicians, is in a large measure attributable to the careless handling of milk.

Completing his tour of Europe, Dr. Vandevent sailed for the United States on the Rochambeau on July 4 from France and arrived in New York on July 14. Mrs. Vandevent and two children returned with Dr. Vandevent from Chicago, where they visited while Dr. Vandevent was in Europe.

The American physicians and surgeons, the largest ever to visit any country in a body, took part in clinics in the various medical centers of Europe.
