STEEL TRADE REPORT GOOD

Outlook Good, But Stock Prices Sluggish

(Wall Street Journal Financial Review)
NEW YORK, July 22.—Although reports from the steel trade and the transportation industries betokened a sound condition in the nation's business and an exceptionally promising outlook for autumn, stocks were sluggish today.

Substantial recessions took place among the market leaders in the general list, breaking entirely away from recent buoyancy.

It was obvious that the reactionary tendencies were wholly due to conditions in the market. After advancing for eight consecutive sessions, the industrial market lost less than a tenth of a point on Tuesday's setback. Hence no real correction was afforded.

Professionals attained considerable success in stocks like Steel, Mack Truck, American Can and General Electric.

Doomed Man's Family Working for Freedom

CHICAGO, July 22.—With less than 18 hours to go, the family and friends of Russell Scott worked feverishly today in an effort to persuade Robert Scott to surrender and save his brother from the gallows.

Great activity is on in Detroit, according to word here. Hints have been received that the former author's brother is in hiding in or around Detroit and that some friend of the condemned man is in touch with him.

"If Robert intended to show up, he would have done so before this," Russell said today.

Hundreds of letters and telegrams appealing for mercy are flooding the office of Governor Len Small, but the governor had made it known that if Robert does not appear, he will not grant another stay of execution.

Appeals to President Coolidge have gone unanswered. Mrs. Catherine Scott, Russell's wife, telegraphed the president to intervene.

Unless the unexpected happens, Scott will be hanged Friday.

Refuse Diplomatic Rank To U. S. Treasury Agents

WASHINGTON, July 22.—France today formally rejected the state department's request for diplomatic status of American treasury agents abroad investigating foreign manufacturing costs to guide congress in making tariff rates.

Great Britain, Sweden, Belgium and Spain have already taken similar action.

The last tariff act provides for such agents to probe foreign production costs under diplomatic privileges and authorizes a tariff boycott against manufacturers blocking such investigations.

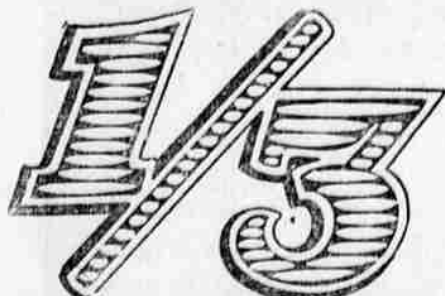
