

# Senators Must Work Harder to Win Pennant This Year

## STARS INJURED, TEAM FIGHTING

### Bucky Harris' Luck of Last Year Gone

 NEW YORK, July 23.—Major league managers and competent critics said the Washington Senators won the American league pennant last year because they did not have a single stroke of bad luck during the championship season.

Bucky Harris and his world's champions, here for a series with the New York Yankees, are getting their bad breaks now and the championship in the American league depends largely upon the duration of Washington's bad breaks.

First, the Senators lost Walter Johnson, who was taken down with an attack of tonsillitis just before the team left home for an important western trip. Johnson was unable to pitch a game on the invasion of enemy territory and the burden fell upon Stan Coveleskie and Dutch Reuther.

Joe Judge then broke down and Joe Harris, another antique who was picked up from the Boston Red Sox, had to be used at first base.

The veteran Peckinpaugh was next when he pulled up with a bad leg, and Deacon Scott, turned away from the Yankees because he was too old, was sent to short.

Next and perhaps worse, Goose Goslin, the leader of the attack and the best hitter on the team, spiked Cole, the Cleveland pitcher, and when he said he had done it intentionally because Cole had tried to bean him, Ban Johnson, the American league president, set him down indefinitely.

"Things might be worse," Bucky Harris said today. "Johnson is ready to work and his absence has been our chief worry. We're satisfied because we're in first place after a lot of bad baseball and some bad luck. We'll be better from now on."

## VENUS, MARS BEAT MOON TO HORIZON

### Unusual Alignment Is Seen In West at Evening

With the bright crescent of the new moon moving slowly toward the lustrous planet Venus and the great red planet Mars, people in Bend and Central Oregon who chanced to glance toward the Cascade skyline shortly after twilight last night witnessed one of the most unusual alignments of heavenly bodies seen here in several years.

The moon, in its ascending node, to use the terms of an astronomer, was less than two degrees distant from Venus as the rotation of the earth shortly before 9 o'clock carried the moon and the planets into the west behind the Three Sisters, as seen from Bend. Persons on ships on the Pacific ocean last night saw the new moon overtake Venus, passing over, or near, this planet. The moon and planet set before the occultation took place, as seen from Central Oregon.

Mars, now rapidly nearing the western horizon at sunset, was not so bright as Venus in the western sky last night, but those who permitted their vision to range close to the Cascade peaks, outlined against the dimming sky, were able to see this giant planet through the thin veil of smoke from forest fires. While Mars and Venus were "in conference" with the moon in the west, Jupiter, largest of all planets, moved toward the zenith from the east.

Tonight, the new moon will be well up in the western sky, but persons wishing to locate Mars and Venus can do so by looking for two bright unscintillating "stars" between the crescent and the horizon.
