STOCK PRICES START UPWARD

Reactionary Tendency of Money Brief

(Wall Street Journal Financial Review)
NEW YORK, July 23.—Reactionary tendencies in the money list proved shortlived after a further brief period of irregularity in today's early dealings. The forward movement was resumed under the leadership of American Can, which spurred sensationally more than eight points to the best price of its existence.

Cotton was also buoyant and moved up sharply, affording a favorable background for renewal of bullish operations.

Stocks leaped forward in a wide variety of issues such as Sears, Roebuck, Montgomery Ward, General Railway Signal, Thomas Tool, New Haven and Washburn. Increasing interest was gained as the rise proceeded and the late afternoon was marked by vigorous constructive demonstrations.

TAX REDUCTION PLANS FORMING

Would Cut \$500,000,000
From Income Returns

Proposal to be Announced Informally Soon by President

(U. P. Leased Wire to The Bend Bulletin)
SWAMPSCOTT, Mass., July 23.—A proposal for a tax reduction which would top of \$500,000,000 from the returns of income taxpayers probably will be announced informally by President Coolidge before he leaves the summer White House early in September for Washington.

Conferees now going on with Senator Curtis, republican whip, and later ones with Secretary of the Treasury Mellon and with other leaders, will enable the president to set an approximate figure for the committee on tax reduction in congress to aim at in drafting the new tax bill in September and October, it was learned.

The President has decided to set a figure much higher than the \$300,000,000 he estimated in June so that the committee will recognize the change in the situation and act accordingly.

Saving Is Seen
Two factors will permit Coolidge to set a larger figure than heretofore anticipated. They are:

The \$250,000,000 treasury surplus on July 1, which was set at nearly \$100,000,000 more than expected.

The fact that "tax reduction" actually tends to increase revenue as frequently pointed out by Secretary Mellon, whose advice show that a larger number of returns and larger incomes are reported when the tax rates are lower.

It has been practically determined, it is understood, that the administration will favor first a maximum surtax of around 20 per cent and will not compromise on anything more than 25 per cent. The present maximum is 40 per cent.
