IN ARCTIC REGION**

**Message From Bowdoin Is
Caught by Amateur**

ABOARD THE MACMILLAN EXPEDITION FLAGSHIP BOWDOIN, off Simintak, Greenland (by Radio to the National Geographic Society and the United Press), July 24.—Delayed.—A welcome sun greeted the MacMillan expedition today as the Bowdoin coasted north along the Greenland shore, beside the dark, shapely coastal peak, gashed by glaciers and streaked with snow.

The arctic circle is expected to be crossed some time today and those aboard who have never crossed the circle before are pondering over the choice of being dropped overboard with a line about their waists or being bathed on decks with buckets of sea water.

The above message was picked up by Alfred W. Everest, operator of amateur station 1 ARE, at 15 White Terrace, Pittsfield, Mass., and transmitted to the Geographic society and the United Press. Everest's station is listed as being only 15 watts power.

**New Badge Is Provided
For American Veterans**

Veterans of America's wars are eligible to wear a new badge, recently authorized by the war department, according to information received by former service men in Bend. The badge is to be worn on civilian clothes. It consists of a dexter eagle with wings displayed perched within a ring which displays seven white and six red vertical stripes with a blue chief bearing the words 'National Defense,' the dexter wings of the eagle behind the ring, the sinister wing in front of the ring.

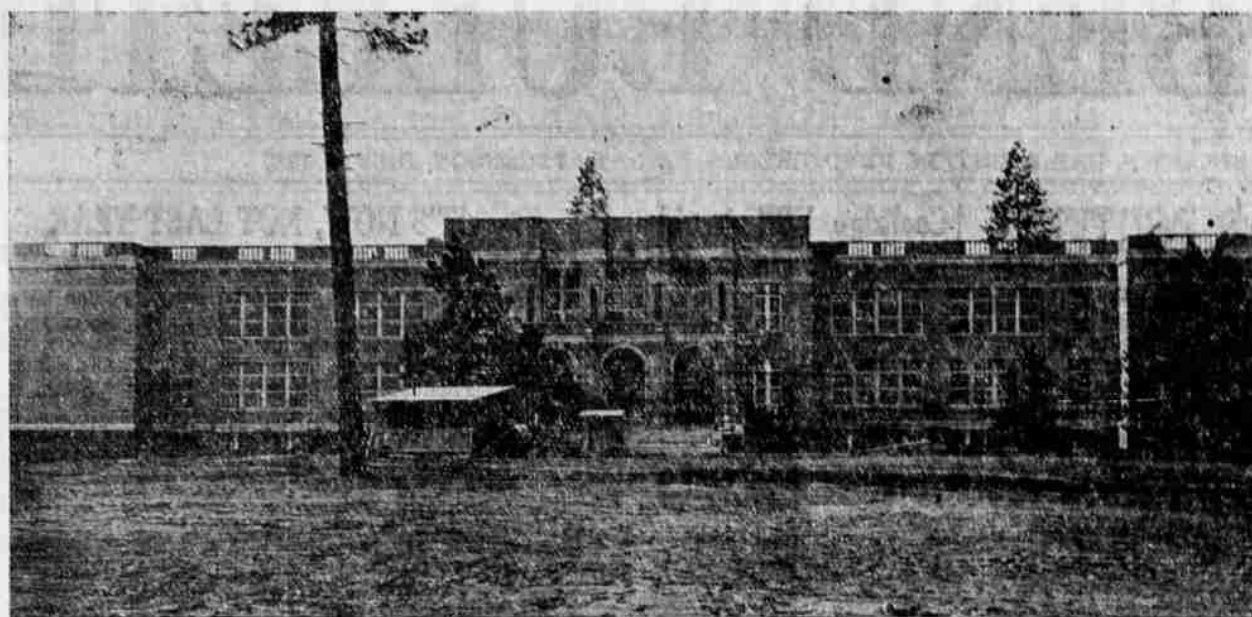
The new badge may be worn only by those who have served honorably in time of war, those who have served honorably in the United States military forces and have been trained and qualified in the grade of private or higher grade.

The new badge may soon be purchased in post exchanges, general stores and commercial firms authorized by the war department.

**Ertle Takes Over Interest

Announcement that George Ertle, one of the owners of the Central Oregon bakery, had taken over the interest of his partner, L. B. Kruse, was made today. Ertle has been active in the management of the bakery since the plant was started here. No announcement as to the business plans of Kruse for the future have been made. Kruse plans to leave on a vacation trip Monday.

New Union High School Completed Today



Under construction since last fall, Bend's new high school structure, one of the largest and most modern of its kind in Oregon east of the Cascades, is being completed today and will be formally inspected by the school board of union high school district No. 2 this afternoon or tomorrow. The inspection will be made previous to the board's acceptance of the work of Contractor E. P. Brosterhouse.

Immediately on the completion of the building, which was erected at a cost of more than \$200,000, work of installing new equipment will be started. This work will include the moving of laboratory equipment from the old high school building and the installation of new school furniture,

including 100 desks. Workers were busy this morning cleaning windows, replacing broken glass and touching up scars in paint and varnish preparatory to the inspection of the school board.

With the work of installing the equipment starting this week end or Monday, the new building, two stories in height and of brick construction, will be ready for occupancy in plenty of time for the start of the fall term, September 7. Several of the instructors of the Bend schools, including John L. Chute, will assist with the work of preparing the building for the start of the fall semester.

Because of the lateness of the season, no lawn will be planted on the

new high school grounds this year, but arrangements were being made today by Superintendent G. W. Ager to employ a group of boy scouts to remove the crop of weeds that has covered the grounds in the past few weeks. It is probable that a cover crop of some kind will be planted this summer. This will be plowed under in the fall, enriching the earth for the lawn which will be planted next spring, according to plans.

The vacated high school building and bungalows will in the future be known as the Central school, it was announced today by Superintendent Ager. This school will be used to house the junior high school classes. Harry Holt will be principal of the Central school during the 1925-26

school year. Eighteen teachers will be assigned to the Central school this fall.

Although the new union high school will be turned over to the school board this week, the basement has not yet been completed, no provision for this work having been made in the contract with Brosterhouse. An item of \$12,000 for the completion of the basement at a future date is included in the budget which is now being passed on by the budget committee.

When completed, the basement will house the shops of the manual training and mechanics departments. It will also contain several other rooms.

**Women Crazier Than
Men by 20 Per Cent**

CHICAGO, July 24.—Science today corroborated man's suspicion, but science is conservative.

**200 Are Injured While
Watching Gobs Parade**

NEW YORK, July 24.—The Melbourne correspondent of the Exchange Telegraph cabled today that 200 persons were injured, including 60 seriously, when a veranda collapsed during a parade of officers and sailors from the American fleet there.

MELBOURNE, July 24.—Hundreds of spectators, mostly girls and women, were hurled to the street during a parade of 2,000 American sailors here today when the veranda outside a motion picture theater collapsed.

One hundred were injured, several fatally.

The streets of Melbourne were gorgeously decorated for a fete in honor of the Americans who arrived with a portion of the Pacific fleet this week.

When the veranda crashed, the parade halted. The American sailors broke ranks and went to the assistance of the victims. Ambulances clanged to the scene and the "Gobs" helped administer first aid.

When the last of the victims had been taken to hospitals, the crowd gave the Americans a tremendous cheer and the parade was resumed.

**JAPANESE OUSTING
TO BE FORGOTTEN**

**Employment at Toledo Re-
sult of Mistake, Stated**

PORTLAND, July 24.—In a statement issued today, I. Oyama, secretary of the Japanese Association of Oregon, expresses hope that the recent ousting of Japanese workmen by residents of Toledo, Oregon, may have no evil results.

Oyama explains that when it was first proposed that Japanese be employed on the "green chain," Toledo business men declared themselves against the employment of Japanese, who immediately agreed not to accept the work. Later the business men changed their decision and the Oriental laborers went to work, only to find that the greater part of the town's population still held their objections to Japanese labor.

The Japanese were under contract to receive \$4 for an eight hour shift, Oyama said, not \$2.40 as was rumored in Toledo.

LEAVES MILLION AND HALF

**Sioux Tribe to Adopt
Vice President Dawes**

CHEYENNE, Wyo., July 24.—Cheyenne was doing its "derndest" today with "Hell and Maria" Dawes, vice president of the United States, here to look on.

When the vice president landed in "Cowtown" last night he looked out on a sea of 10 gallon hats and was taken to his hotel in a dilapidated stage coach which saw service on the plains 49 years ago.

Late today Dawes will be made a chief of the Sioux Indians and Governor Nellie Taylor Ross will be made a princess. Full rites will be performed, Dawes and Governor Ross being the first "pale faces" ever adopted by the tribe.

**44 Scouts Now In Camp;
Only 3 Return to Homes**

Forty-four boys, from various parts of Central Oregon, are at present in training at Scout lake under the supervision of W. B. Morse, boy scout executive. When the first week of training ended, only three of the Bend boys returned to their homes. Several of these found it necessary to come home because their parents were going on vacation trips. One of the Bend boys whose name was not included in the list of local scouts attending the summer camp is Daniel Taylor. A truck load of supplies and equipment was sent to Scout lake today by Myron Symons, head of the camping department.
