

American Champ Better Than Ever, Early Play Shows

LITTLE HELEN ADDS STROKE

Constant Playing With Men Improves Game

NEW YORK, July 24.—Helen Wills is playing better tennis than she ever did. Her game is better and stronger and so much improved that she is a cinch for the championship, in the opinion of those who have been watching early tournament competition.

Miss Wills has added a chop stroke to her game and has been using it most effectively to draw her opponents in from the base line and crossing them with a powerful forehand stroke. She learned the stroke from the Kinsey boys and apparently she has been working at perfecting it during the off season. Constant practice with male opponents has made her game even stronger and more virile than it was last year and it seems to have given her new faith in herself, although she always had plenty of confidence.

Because of the belief that she was going to make a serious attempt to come back and win her title back, Mrs. Molla Mallory, seven time champion, has been attracting attention in her early matches.

She was defeated yesterday in the Manchester tournament by Miss Mary K. Browne, former champion and the second ranking player. It would not seem from this that Mrs. Mallory has reorganized her game. The defeat does not mean much, however, as Mrs. May Sutton Bundy, another California star, was beaten in her first tournament.

With Miss Wills and Miss Browne playing as they are and with Mrs. Mallory, Mrs. Bundy, Mrs. Jessup and Miss Eleanor Goss to call upon, it looks as if the American team will run away with the Wimbledon cup when they meet the English team at Forest Hills next month.

Miss Wills and Miss Browne won the doubles finals by defeating Mrs. J. Jessup of Wilmington, Del., and Eleanor Goss, New York, in straight sets, 6-2, 6-3.

TETHEROW THROUGH AS HEAVY, FEARED

Milk Bucket Accident Keeps "Iron Man" Out of Game

Jess Tetherow, who has pitched on Central Oregon baseball teams for the past 20 years or more, will be missed from the diamond for the rest of the present year, and there is a possibility that he may not pitch again, as a result of a peculiar accident which occurred while he was carrying a bucket full of milk on his lunch below Redmond recently.

The bucket struck against some obstacle and in some unexplained manner Tetherow's elbow was thrown out of joint. The arm was set at once and would not be a serious injury in anyone else, but at present Tetherow can't throw a baseball, and in an arm which has to stand what a pitching arm does, it is feared that the accident was just enough to prevent his pitching any more.

Still, it is recalled, Tetherow fell into a crevasse on Bachelor mountain several years ago and was so seriously hurt that it was predicted that he never would play ball. And it may be that Central Oregon's "iron man" can weather an elbow dislocation just as successfully.

Tetherow has been playing with Brooks-Scanlon recently, and it was expected that he would pitch against the Prineville Knights of Pythias team Sunday. It is probable now that Dieters, Oliver or Slate will do the throwing.

Brooks-Scanlon has strengthened its already phenomenal batting order by securing E. H. Kennedy, former professional who managed the Bend team last year. He will play left field.
