

Harney County Elk Gets Haircut Before Entering Lodge

STUFFED BULL OFTEN HONORED

Former Head of Herd Is In from Grand Lodge

His buckskin colored hair roughened by many miles of travel and bleached by more than a score of years of Central Oregon sunlight, the giant mounted elk which arrived in Bend yesterday from Portland, where it was on exhibit at the B. P. O. E. national convention, is to have the services of a barber.

Not only is the big stuffed elk, one-horned of the herd of 20 that roamed the Alvord ranch in Harney county a quarter of a century ago, to get his "neek whiskers" trimmed, but he is also to experience an application of "slickum"—that same brand of hair tonic used by latter day sheiks—according to plans outlined by E. J. Catlow, Elks' steward.

The stuffed Elk, in all probability the only animal of that species in America honored by being on exhibit at a world's fair—the Lewis and Clark exposition in Portland in 1905—and at a national convention, will be on exhibit in the Bend Elks' hall for an indefinite time. The elk this morning was in the hallway of the B. P. O. E. building.

Through an arrangement made with the Harney county court, the Bend lodge of Elks was able to secure the stuffed animal, 14 1/2 hands high, for the Portland convention. For a number of years the elk was on exhibit in the Burns Commercial club, but in recent years was in the Harney county court house. It is the property of Harney county. The elk will probably be left in Bend until an Elks' lodge is established in Burns.

The elk was given to officials of the Lewis and Clark exposition in 1905 by Frank Clegg, manager of the Alvord ranch. The animal, which weighed approximately 1,000 pounds when alive, was selected from the Alvord herd and mounted by a government taxidermist.

NEW YORK, July 25.—The Boston Braves, under the fiery leadership of Dave Macraff, are earning the reputation of giant killers this season. The Braves may not be going any place themselves, but they are making it hard for the leading clubs that are trying to get some place.

The Braves pulled the Giants out of first place Thursday when they took one game of a double header, and yesterday they pulled them down further in the race by grabbing another victory, while the Pittsburgh Pirates were winning a game from the Cardinals.

So far this season the Braves have won nine out of 17 games from the champions, and those nine games would look good to John McGraw right now.

The Giants have a superstitious idea that the Braves have something on them and McGraw tried to dispel this notion before the team left New York with a pointed club house lecture, but it seems to have availed little.

Getting bumped around in Boston will not start the Giants out very well on the trip through the west which may decide the National league pennant.

Dempsey Starting Training Shortly

LOS ANGELES, July 25.—Jack Dempsey and his bride, Estelle Taylor, were resting at their Hollywood home today, following arrival last night from their European honeymoon.

Dempsey said he was ready to fight and that he would go into training at once. His first bout probably will be against Harry Greb at Michigan City, Ind., late in September.

"I am ready to fight and will start training immediately," Dempsey said. "I expect to find a location for a training camp in the mountains. My first fight will take place in Michigan City in September against any man selected for me by Promoter Floyd Fitzsimmons and the Chicago newspapers."

Dempsey said he had not yet seen Jack Kearns, his manager, but would have a conference with him within a few days.

Reports that he had an appointment with the New York boxing commission last Tuesday, were erroneous, Dempsey said.

"I have a satisfactory agreement with the New York boxing commission by accepting Harry Wills' challenge and have signed with Tex Rickard to fight Wills," Dempsey said. Matters in regard to the Wills match will be taken care of by Tex Rickard and the New York commission.

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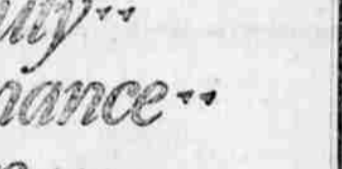
