STOCK PRICES
GAIN RAPIDLY

Rail Group Sees Unprecedented Quotations

(Wall Street Journal Financial Review)
NEW YORK, July 27.—Stocks pushed ahead rapidly to record territory in today's session. With the industrial averages at the highest levels in history further substantial prices also were attained by Frisco common and the Wabash issues in the railroad group.

Industrial stocks which reached the year's best prices embraced shares representative in widely diversified manufacturing and commercial fields. Among these were Montgomery Ward, Sears Roebuck, American Radiator, Famous Players, Remington Typewriter, Mack Truck, White Motor and Woolworth.

Under cover of the rapid character of the rise in many stocks and the bullish enthusiasm created by the market's buoyancy, considerable selling was effected in various industrial favorites. While this liquidation failed to check the advancing tendencies of the general list, many observers felt the present buying movement has spent its course.

CROPS SPECIALIST IS DUE ON MONDAY
Crook County Fields to be Inspected by Jackman

PRINEVILLE, July 27.—E. R. Jackman, farm crop specialist from the extension service at Oregon Agricultural college, will be in Prineville Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, and with W. B. Tucker, Crook county agricultural agent, will inspect both potato and grain fields in Crook county, particularly the Powell Butte and Ochoco project fields. Following his tour here, Jackman will leave for Deschutes county, and with W. T. McDonald, Deschutes county agent, will inspect that territory Friday, Saturday and Monday.

Beginning at 8 o'clock Tuesday morning, the farm crop specialist and the county agent, will start the potato inspection tour in the Powell Butte section. The Powell Butte Seed Potato association will meet them in a body, for the purpose of determining what diseases are found in potato fields, in order that growers can eliminate them from diseased plants in fields. About 12 potato growers in the association are growing certified potato seed. Netted Gems, Members of the association, whose fields will be inspected, are S. D. Mustard, Herman K. Allen, Marvin Thomas, Harry Reed, William Peterson, Edgar Peterson, George Kinsler, George C. Truesdale, E. R. Agee, E. N. Hall, R. H. Roberts and Frank Kinsler.

On Wednesday and Thursday they will devote their attention to grain and potato crops at Powell Butte and on the Ochoco project. Certified potato growers on the project are Ray Graffenberg, on the E. T. Slayton ranch east of Prineville; Roy Stewart, Roy Hibbard, Frank Hulub and Cyril Siroteck.

Trial plots of flax and a five acre field of peas for seed on the project will also receive attention from Jackman and Tucker.
