

Swimmers Of Three Nations To Attempt English Channel

AMERICAN GIRL GIVEN CHANCE

To Attempt Feat Successive Days

CAPE GIRLS NEZ, France, July 29.—Three swimmers from three nations may engage in a race against time next week in an attempt to swim across the English channel.

Miss Gertrude Eberle will represent the United States, Mrs. Augustin will carry the colors of France, and Miss Lillian Harrison will make the second attempt of the year for Argentina.

It was proposed that the three swimmers start at the same time and, while the swimmers had no objections, their coaches opposed it.

Captain James Wolff, trainer of the American star, said that in such competition neither swimmer could do without justice.

According to present plans, Mrs. Augustin may start Monday, Miss Harrison may start on Wednesday, and Miss Eberle on Thursday. Plans, of course, are all subject to weather conditions.

NEW YORK, July 29.—Gertrude Eberle, young American swimmer, will have the "best voyage" of a whole nation behind her when she attempts to swim across the English channel next week.

Swimming sharp here all hope that she becomes the first woman to perform the hardest feat in athletics, but they are dubious about her chances.

"If any woman can do it, she can," Joe Rudy, swimming star of the New York Athletic club and the world's greatest water polo player, says.

"It isn't merely a matter of swimming that distance," he said. "It is a question of fighting water, tide and currents that pull on you. She is a strong swimmer and has plenty of courage."

Miss Eberle proved, when she swam in record time from the Battery to New York to Sandy Hook, that she was capable of a distance longer than the 21 miles "bird line" (over Cape Iris, Nez to Dover, but the conditions otherwise cannot be compared).

No swimmer ever will be able to cross the channel on a direct line. To fight changing tides and currents in the channel, a swimmer must constantly change the course and describe a "W" shaped route. In some cases it has been estimated that a swimmer had to go 40 miles, only to fall with lead in sight, by a miscalculation of the tide on the far side. Miss Eberle has in her favor a form of training that has proved to be superior to the methods followed by foreign athletes, and she has been working for more than a year with the channel fight in mind.

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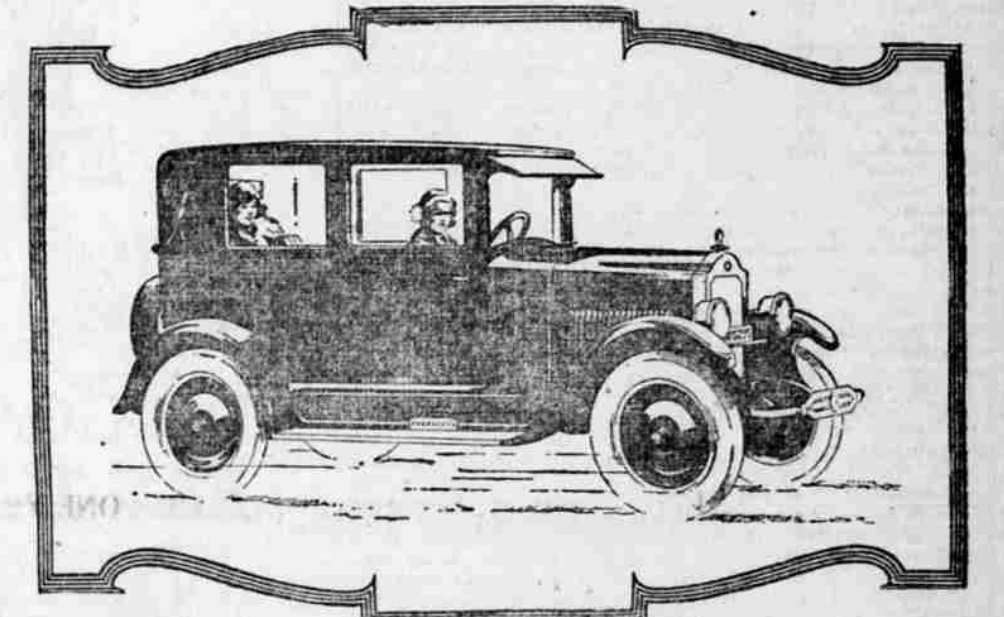
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
