

SPEAKER URGES BAN ON WRECKS

Ancient Cars Are Seen As Danger Source

Oregon Licenses Will Reach 200,000 This Year, Predicts Joe Dunne

Automobiles which are virtual wrecks, should, as a measure of safety to other motorists, be taken from the highways of the state.

With 197,000 automobiles licensed already this year, the number of machines in Oregon will reach the 200,000 mark before December 31, 1925.

It will surprise many to learn that at present there are 50,000 more automobiles than there are telephones in this state.

If the state highway commission sees fit to oil certain highways, only one-half of the roadbed should be oiled at a time, or detours should be provided.

Roads in Oregon now under construction should be completed before new undertaking in highway work is considered.

These are a few of the statements emphasized by Joe Dunne, president of the Oregon State Motor association, in his address to members of the Bend Commercial club today noon in the Elks' dining room.

Dunne made mention of these things when outlining policies of the state motor association, and when discussing the work of the state highway commission and the legislature.

In his brief talk, replete with statistics, Dunne made mention of the gasoline tax, reminding his audience that Oregon was the first state to adopt such a tax. All but three states have a gasoline tax now.

There are now 720 miles of paved highway in Oregon, it was mentioned by Dunne. The gross expenditure of the highway commission, not including market roads, since 1917 has been \$76,000,000.

In opening his address, Dunne paid high tribute to the legislative work of R. S. Hamilton, state representative from the Central Oregon counties, Jay H. Upton, state senator, and others from this section of the state who have been active in road legislation at Salem.

Experts Studying Life Of Convicted Murderer

(U. P. Leased Wire to The Bend Bulletin) CHICAGO, July 29.—Three alienists are charting the full life of Russell Scott, former millionaire, in an effort to prove that he is "prison crazy." If they can convince a jury that Scott is insane, the prisoner, who on two occasions escaped hanging by eleven-hour stays of execution, will go to an insane asylum instead of the gallows.

Scott's cell today was a scientific laboratory, filled with numerous instruments. Dr. William O. Krohn, who was on the side of the prosecution in the Leopold-Luch case, has been retained by the state.

Flare Draws Autoists When Woodshed Burns

Fire at 9 o'clock last night destroyed the wood shed of B. H. White, located west of the river in the alley between Lexington and Kingston streets. Cause of the fire was not determined.

Attracted by the flare from the burning building, hundreds of motorists from all parts of the city rushed to the scene of the blaze, causing considerable congestion.

No estimate as to the loss resulting from the fire has been made, but it is said to be comparatively small. The fire department answered a general alarm.
