THOSE CORVALLIS ELEPHANTS

Oregon of prehistoric ages is believed to have left its imprint in the blue mud of the Corvallis country, which, as was reported in a news story this week, has been found to hold teeth of elephants of the geologic past.

There was time, in the Pleistocene age of geologists, when virtually all of the Willamette basin and much of the lower Columbia valley were covered by a fresh water sound.

As this great river, mightier than any of the present world, raced toward the sound, it cut its way through obstructing land masses, and its tributaries, such as the Deschutes, ate back into lakes and glutinous bogs, death traps for the creatures that lived in the plateau country.

Laden with debris, the Columbia finally churned through its basalt gorge toward the Willamette sound. There the swift flowing current met the still water of the valley sea.

Whether the fossil teeth found near Corvallis were those of tropical elephants that perished in Soap Creek, or whether they are "erratics" of the Willamette sound, later buried in the Soap Creek formation, is conjectural.

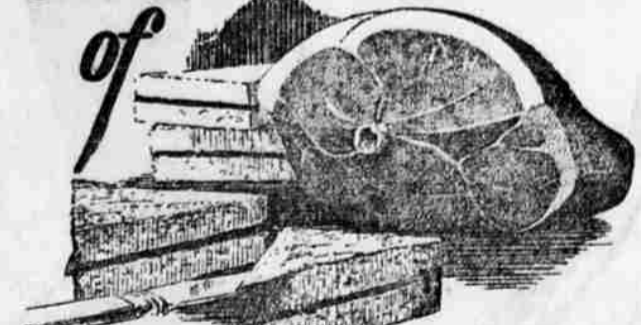
Army Officer 20 Years Visiting Powell Butte

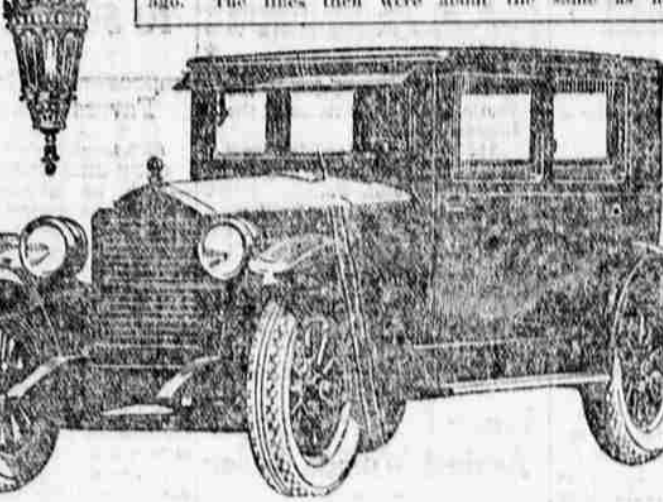

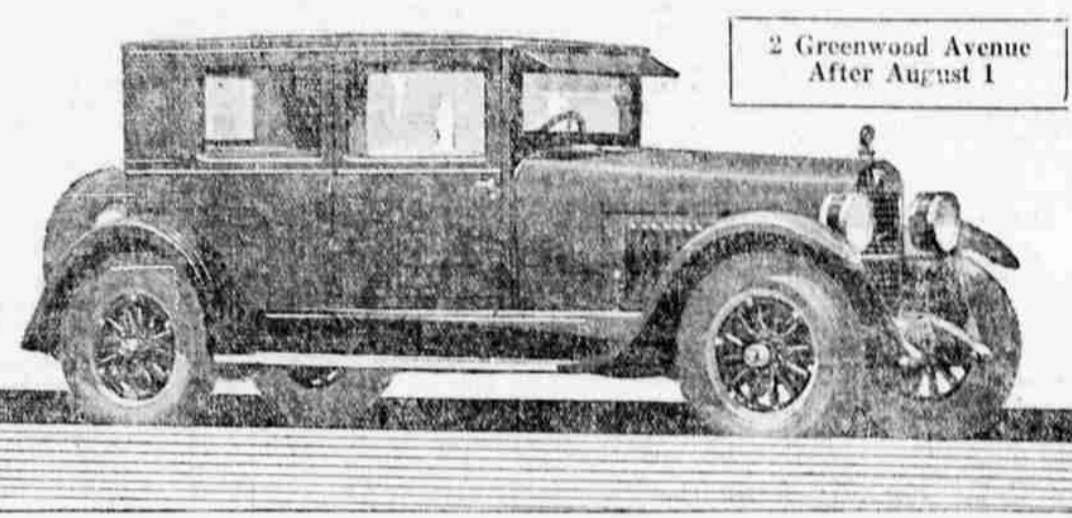
